Things That Pay.

Commercial fertilizers are chemically prepared plant food. They are mixtures which contain, or are supposed to contain, certain elements in soluble form which will increase the crops. A fertilizer containing 8-2-2 means that you expect to find 8 per cent of phosphoric acid. As there are 2,000 pounds in a ton this would give 20 times 8—160 pounds of phosphoric acid in a ton, so twice 20 (forty) pounds of ammonia and twice twenty (forty) pounds of potash. All these give you 240 pounds of soluble plant food in a ton. The rest of the ton is worthless to the crop. As we commonly use about 200 pounds per acre, or a ton to ten this gives us sixteen phosphoric acid, four ammonia and four per acre. not per and
