The levee which broke is a private one, maintained by the state. Angola is one of the finest cotton plantations in Louisiana, It was formerly owned by S. L. James, the late penitentiary lessee, but was purchased by the state when the convict lease was abolished and the state took charge of the convicts. The crevasse will doubtless cover the entire plantation with water, but it is said that becouse of the location no other valuable property is likely to be affected.
