Old and Respected Citizen Gone

Squire John H. Paxton, of the Cherryfield Section, Lays Down Life's Burden.

It is the sad duty of the News to record the death of this most estimable gentleman who died at his home near Cherryfield station Sunday night, aged 84 years.

John H. Paxton, sen., or "Squire John," as he was familiarly called, was one of the best and most widely known citizens of Transylvania county. He was known among his neighbors for his many acts of charity and neighborly kindness, and throughout the county for his services in various public capacities. He was a magistrate for thirty years, was elected to the legislature in 1879 and served two years, being called to Raleigh by a special session during the second year of his term. He was public spirited, honest and reliable in all his dealings, and his public services were more for the good of others than for the emoluments of the positions. If he had an enemy in the world it is unknown to us.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. J. B. Hyder at Greenwood church and several from Brevard were in attendance. The interment was at Greenwood cemetery and his remains were laid in their last resting place by loving hands. May the record of a well-spent life be an incentive to the rising generation to emulate his example.

The life partner in his joys and sorrows, his aged wife, still remains to mourn her loss. His family are all grown and married, and all except A. F. Paxton have found homes in other sections of the country. He remains at the old home to care for and comfort his mother in her declining years. The News extends its sympathy to the bereaved ones in this hour of their affliction.

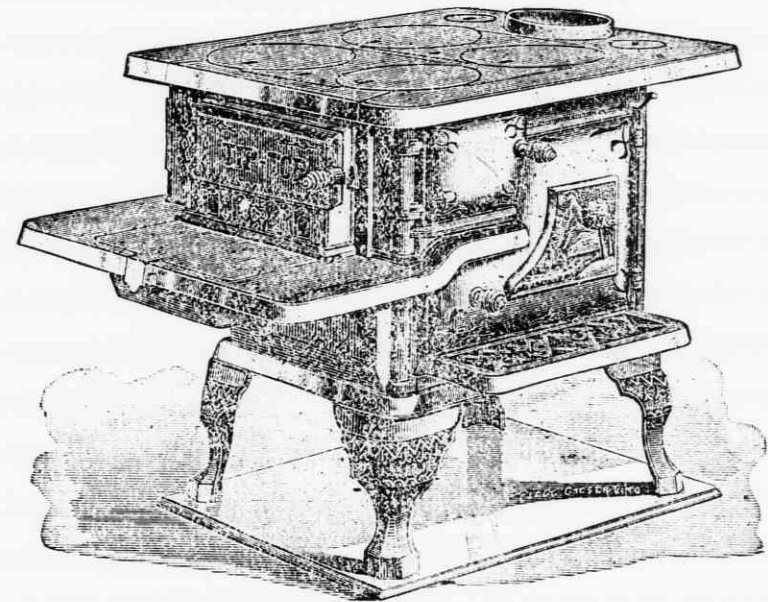
