Telegraph Line.

Direct Communication by Wire With the
Business World.

At last Brevard is to be connected
by wire with the outside world. For
the last ten or more years we have
had a telephone line, but owing to
our rapid growth and the number of
business enterprises now in operation
here it has been found necessary to
build a telegraph line. It will be but
a very short time until it will be
built and ready for use. The line
from here to Lake Toxaway is now
being constructed, and immediately
upon its completion one from here to
Hendersonville will be erected.

urging this line for some time past,
and we now see the fruition of our
hopes. This is also another instance
of the good that the Toxaway Com-
pany does Brevard, for it was instru-
mental in securing the building of this
line.

Lost Alleys.

It seems as if the Town has
about lost some of her alleys in
the lapse of time. The attention
of the Mayor and Board of Alder-
men is called to certain public 20-
foot highways that are now closed.
First is the alley crossing
Caldwell street at the end of Mor-
gan street and running north 64
degrees west 165 feet, thence
north 26 degrees east 264 feet to
Jordan street, being 20 feet wide.
Then there are alleys running
from Poor street around the side
and back of lot No. 75 and along
the backs of lots 76-77-78 and 79
and running into Caldwell street.
The alleys running around lots
58-60-61 and 62 are also closed
up and should be looked after.

to try and hold the ground by
possession unless the Town opens
them to the public.

more progressive set of citizens
and they demand good streets
