If it be found to employ a teacher whose salary in four months would be more than is apportioned to the school for which he is employed, then the amount over must be made up by private subscription. Due regard has been given to schools needing more than one teacher.

GEORGIA LEGISLATURE.

Child Labor Bill Meets With Defeat In the House.

Atlanta, July 9.—Defeat in the delegates forecasted by the opponents of the child labor bill was the fate of that measure in the house of representatives yesterday, at the conclusion of a debate which lasted for six hours.

Opponents of the bill asserted confidently on Tuesday night that they had 90 votes. The result of the roll call in the house at noon yesterday disclosed the fact that they had lost only one of these, while the vote for the measure was about what had been conceded by them, its failure being recorded by 89 to 75.

The debate yesterday was somewhat more of a picturesque one than that of the day before. The speakers had a shorter time allotted to them, and there was a little more ginger about the proceeding. A little tilt between Mr. Moses, of Coweta, and Mr. Tigner, of Muscogee, served to enliven the proceedings quite a bit. Mr. Tigner had raised some question as to Mr. Moses' political record, as to his Democracy, and though Mr. Moses was not in the hall at the time, he heard of it and came back with quite a sharp reply.

There was considerable feeling displayed by some of the speakers, but it was all in good nature, and the evidence was abundant that every vote was the result of an honest, straightforward opinion as to the merits of the measure.

As on the day before, the gallery was crowded with interested listeners, and now and then Speaker Morris had to demand a cessation of applause.

The Australian ballot bill failed to receive a constitutional majority in the senate yesterday after the provision that it should not become effective until approved by the grand juries had been stricken from the measure.

This morning a motion to reconsider this action will be made and the probability is that the grand jury provision will be put in the bill. When this is done, there are assurances that a requisite constitutional majority will be forthcoming.

Kishineff Ringleader Suicides.

Berlin, July 11.—The Frankfurter Zeitung says it learns by way of Bucharest, Roumania, that the ringleader of the Kishineff atrocities, a man named Pinerjewski, has committed suicide at Kishineff because the director of the Russian ministry of justice had arrived there, commanded by the czar to make a stringent investigation into the horrors. The Zeitung also says it learns from another source that former Governor Von Roban has returned to Kishineff and is endeavoring to get the Jewish population of that place to unite in a testimonial to the effect that he behaved correctly during the massacres.

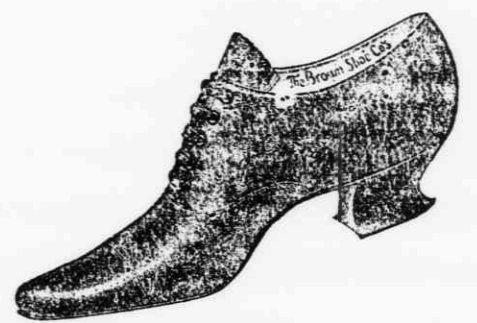
