

Base Hits.

(Held over from last week.)

Brevard's great baseball team has been playing winning ball right along. The games of last Thursday and Friday which were lost to Hendersonville just balanced the account with that team and on Saturday the tie was played off on the Hendersonville grounds. A grand game was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators, and after the last man was out in the ninth inning and the tallies were reckoned up it was found that Brevard had won the game by the narrow margin of one run, the score being Brevard 4, Hendersonville 3. The large delegation of Brevard people which went down on a special train to witness the game returned home highly pleased with the trip and with the playing of "our boys."

The Concord baseball team arrived in town Monday morning according to arrangement. They came with a high reputation as baseball players and many doubts were expressed as to the ability of the Brevard team to cope with them. But to the surprise of the Concord men Brevard walked away with the first two games in a style which indicated strongly that Concord could learn a good deal from Brevard about how to play the game. Monday's game was won by the score of 7 to 1 in favor of Brevard, while Tuesday's game resulted in a "whitewash" for Concord while Brevard ran up a score of fifteen runs. The local team fielded and batted magnificently, showing the good effects of steady training.

In Wednesday's game the tables were turned and Brevard received the "whitewash," but Concord could only make one run. One to nothing is a remarkable score and is seldom seen even in professional games. There is but little discredit to the loser to be beaten in such a game.

Large crowds, among which were many ladies, witnessed all the games, and every skillful play on either side evoked loud applause from the spectators. It is a clear fact that baseball as played by our team this year is entitled to and has the admiration and support of all the people.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week the crack team from Shelby, N. C., will be with us and try to wrest some laurels from the Brevard team. The Shelbyites are very confident, having beaten Concord in the last game they played with them and having also strengthened their team in the meantime. Close and exciting games will doubtless be witnessed by those who attend. As these games may be the last this season it behooves all, "both great and small," to get out and see them. Preparations for returning to college will require the attention of our ball players and baseball will soon have to be brought to an end for this season.

The results in the three Shelby games were perfectly satisfactory to Brevard. Shelby took Friday's game by the score of 10 to 5, while the games of Thursday and Saturday went to Brevard by 11 to 1 and 11 to 7 respectively. Brevard thus winning two out of the three games played.

The Brevard team has certainly won its title to the championship of the state, and we expect it will hold the championship year after year. It was an "all around team" of the first water,

as good at fielding as at batting, and excelling in both. The playing of the individual members of the team was frequently of the "star" order, such as is seen in National League games. Not only in playing ability did they win respect, but also in the matter of gentlemanly behavior, both on and off the field, did they bring credit to themselves and to Brevard.
