#### TORNADO CREATES HAVOC.

Many Houses Destroyed at Pittsburg. Two Persons Killed.

Pittsburg, Kans., August 10 .- A tornado passed through the thickly populated mining district north and east of Pittsburg early Saturday, destroying hundreds of houses, mine tipples and buildings of every description, leveling to a mass of wreckage a large portion of every camp between Devlin Miller shaft, north of Fontenac, and the Morgan shaft, north of the state line, and coverting into ruin a strip of thickly populated territory 8 miles long and 2 miles wide. At least two persons were killed and fully 60 were injured in the storm.
