

## JAPS NOW AFTER THE AMERICA'S CUP

Naval Official Says They will Be In Next Race.

### PROPOSE TO BUILD A YACHT.

Official Says They Can Build Just as Fine a Yacht as Either America or England, and Believes They Can Come Away Winner.

New York, August 22.—If Lieutenant Commander Isam Takahire, of the Imperial Japanese navy, can carry out his plans, Japan will have a yacht in the next contest of the America's cup. The commander, who came here to see the struggle between Shamrock III and Reliance, declares he will interest financial men in his country to prepare at once for the building of a racer to enter the next international races.

"We can build just as fine a boat as either America or England," he said, "and you may be sure that at the next international yacht races you will see the flag of Japan flying on the winner."

### SENDS STRONG NOTE.

American Claims Pending Against Colombia.

New York, August 21.—Mail advices from Bogota report that United States Minister Beaupre has sent a strong official note to the minister of foreign affairs, stating, in the name of Secretary Hay, that all American claims pending against Colombia must be settled by diplomatic intervention, and not by local courts, cables the Colon correspondent of The Herald. Advices from Barranquilla say that General Jose Vasquez Cobos, the former military chief of Panama, who headed the military coup of July 26 against the governor, was imprisoned there and sent to Bogota Aug. 15 under military escort.

It is reported that General Cobb's brother, Alfredo Vasquez Cobos, the minister of war, has resigned his portfolio.

### RACE WAR IS FEARED.

Negroes of Whitewright, Tex., Are Fleeing the Town.

Chicago, August 21.—A dispatch to The Record-Herald from Dallas, Tex., says:

"News from Whitewright, Tex., is to the effect that all of the negroes of the town, more than a hundred persons, have fled for fear of a race war. A negro attacked a white woman about a year ago and that night a negro accused of the offense was hanged by a mob, but was rescued and saved from death by the sheriff and a posse. Notices were posted ordering all negroes to leave the place and the blacks fled.

"A Texas and Pacific negro excursion from Louisiana and eastern Texas to El Paso, arranged recently, has been called off on protests from the mayor and chief of police of El Paso, who feared race troubles."

### Iron Company Succeeding.

Birmingham, Ala., August 21.—Industrial circles here have received information that the Woodstock Iron company, Anniston, is meeting with great success in the operation of its No. 4 furnace at Anniston. The furnace went into blast a few weeks since, and is now turning out from 200 to 205 tons of iron daily. Charles T. Williams, formerly in charge of the Sloss-Sheffield Steel and Iron company's North Birmingham furnaces, is in charge of the iron-maker at Anniston, and in the next four or five months, it is believed, that another of the Woodstock furnaces will be started up. Gentry Hillman is the expert at the head of the furnaces.

### Covington Must Hang.

Jacksonville, Fla., August 22.—The death warrant is here and Archie Covington will hang from the gallows in the county jail on Sept. 11. Covington has been convicted of the murder of Jim Williams on Aug. 12, 1900, at a turpentine camp about 10 miles west of Jacksonville. Belle, the wife of Williams, was also indicted at the same time as Covington, and was sent to the state penitentiary for life. The jury which was drawn to decide the cause of Williams' death brought in a verdict in the case of Covington as guilty of murder in the first degree. In the case of the woman, she was also found guilty of murder in the first degree, but the jury made a recommendation for mercy of the court.

### Gould, Inventor, Dead.

Boston, August 22.—George M. Gould, manufacturer of pianos, is dead at his home in Brooklyn. He was related to Professor Morse, inventor, of the telegraph. Disastrous fires

caused financial reverses a few years ago, but he pursued another invention with a view of mending his invention and received his first royalties on the day of his death.

### Derrick Used to Handle Coffin.

Bristol, Pa., August 21.—Wilson Lippincott, the largest man in Pennsylvania, has just been buried. Lippincott, who was once a noted jig dancer, weighed 560 pounds at the time of his death. A derrick was used in handling the casket at the grave after 13 men had carried it there.

### DESPERADO ARRESTED.

Had Long Been a Terror in North Carolina.

Raleigh, N. C., August 21.—A party of officers, federal and state, made a raid yesterday morning before daylight in Cumberland county and captured Antony Ray, a desperado and leader of a band of outlaws, known in all that section as the "Bluge Gange."

For ten years this man has been wanted in three counties for murder, robbery and arson. The officers had an adventurous trip in search of this criminal, a negro, named Campbell, whose life had been threatened by Ray, leading them 5 miles through a swamp, the only light being lightning flashes.

Ray was found in his house; would not open the door, and it had to be broken down. The door was so low and so peculiarly built that the pursuers had to crawl in. They found Ray standing in a corner with a dark quilt thrown over his head, with slits in it as peep holes. His double-barreled gun was in his hands and he placed the muzzle of it against a deputy sheriff's body and pulled the trigger, but the gun snapped. Ray was arrested and tied.

He and his wife are both in jail at Fayetteville.

### Customs House Official Resigns.

New York, August 21.—Samuel W. Thompson, acting disbursing agent for the New York customs house has resigned on account of impaired sight and advanced age. He was one of the government officials mentioned in connection with the recent exposure of a so-called gold mining company, but declared that he resigned from the directory of the concern upon learning of its business nature, before the matter became public.

### French Will Despatch Fleet.

Paris, August 22.—A dispatch to the Patrie from Marseilles says that owing to the grave conditions in Turkey a division of the French Mediterranean fleet has been ordered to hold itself in readiness to sail early next week. The expedition numbers ten ships. The flagship is the battleship Brennus.
