

SEABOARD LINE NOT TO CHANGE HANDS

Will Not Go to 'Frisco or Rock Island Roads.

REMAINS INDEPENDENT LINE.

An Offer of the Property to the Lines Heretofore Mentioned is Said to Have Been Definitely Declined—Foreign Interests in Road.

New York, Sept. 28.—The Seaboard Air Line railway line will not be turned over to the 'Frisco or to the Rock Island, says The Herald. Foreign banking interests heretofore identified with the Seaboard have been admitted to a participation in the syndicate which a few weeks ago acquired control of the property and this syndicate will, it is stated, continue to operate the Seaboard as an independent system.

An offer of the property to the lines mentioned is said to have been definitely declined. However, President B. F. Yoakum, of the 'Frisco, will remain in the voting trust of the Seaboard.

Arrangements which the 'Frisco-Rock Island properties have made for gulf outlets and terminals in New Orleans, will supply all the requirements for the system, and it has been decided that the benefits to be derived from the purchase of the Seaboard by the Rock Island would scarcely balance the obligations which would necessarily be assumed by the acquisition of the Seaboard.

KNUCKS AND PISTOL USED.

Chicago Policeman Fatally Shot with His Own Weapon.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Policeman Dennis Fitzgerald was shot and fatally wounded early today at the corner of Forty-fourth and Michigan boulevard by one of two negroes, whom he had stopped. While he was talking to the men one of them struck him in the face with a pair of brass knuckles knocking him down and stunning him.

While he lay on the ground the negroes beat him nearly to death with his own club and finally shot him with his own revolver.

After being taken to the hospital Fitzgerald revived long enough to say that he knew one of the men and that his name was Lewis Fitford.

No arrests have been made as yet.

REPORTS ARE UNFOUNDED.

France Entertains No Scheme of Conquest of Morocco.

Paris, Sept. 26.—The French foreign office declares that any negotiations with Great Britain on the subject of Morocco do not go beyond the question of a general good understanding. The officials flatly deny that France is entertaining schemes for a protectorate over or a conquest of Morocco, and express surprise at the persistence of the press reports attributing such plans to France and asserting that Great Britain's consent has been purchased by concessions in Egypt. The utmost that could happen in the case of certain eventualities would be that France would exercise her right of assisting the sultan in policing the frontier districts.

Jailer Overpowered and Escaped.

Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 26.—A special to The Sentinel from Madisonville, Tenn., says Worth White escaped from the county jail at that place this morning about 9 o'clock. White together with another prisoner overpowered the jailer, secured his keys and then locked him in a cell. White alone escaped, however. A posse is in pursuit. White was this week sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary on the charge of felonious assault.

Gives Up Turf for Baseball.

New York, Sept. 26.—It is reported that Frank Farrell, owner of many good race horses among which are the Musketeer, King Pepper and Blues, has decided to retire from the turf. He is principal stockholder of the New York American League Baseball Club, and will devote himself entirely to its development.

Jett is Taken to Louisville Jail.

Cynthiana, Ky., Sept. 26.—Judge Osborne today ordered Sheriff Leach and his deputies to take Curtis Jett, sentenced to be hanged Dec. 18 for the assassination of James Cockrill, to the Louisville jail for safe-keeping, pending Jett's appeal to the court of appeals. Sheriff Leach left with Jett on the Louisville and Nashville train at 10:30 o'clock by way of Lexington.

CURTIS JETT SENTENCED.

To Be Hanged Dec. 18 For Killing James Cockrill.

Cynthiana, Ky., Sept. 26.—Curtis Jett was brought into the court today when Judge Osborne decreed that he be hanged "between sunrise and sunset Dec. 18 for killing James Cockrill at Jackson, Ky., July 21, 1902."

Judge Blanton, attorney for Jett replied:

"Well, Judge, there will be many sunrises and sunsets before he has been hanged."

Jett himself said to the court: "There are people in this county who will be grieved if I am not hanged; but Judge, I do not think you would be grieved, as you have given me a fair trial in this case."

When Judge Osborne said he would send the prisoner to another jail, Jett pleaded earnestly not to be returned to Lexington, Ky. Judge Blanton filed papers giving his grounds for a new trial, preparatory to carrying the case to the court of appeals at Frankfort.

DREW THE COLOR LINE.

Chicago Pupils Would Not Study Under Negro.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Because Mary Crunschfield, a negro cadet teacher, was appointed to relieve Miss Catherine Ralph, white, regular teacher at the Oak Ridge school, absent because of illness, the pupils of the sixth grade revolted and before noon the school board had a formidable strike on its hands.

When the rebellion first became apparent the janitor, acting on the advice of the board, locked in the basement the larger boys, but the trouble spread and the parents began taking a hand.

Defiant at first, the board of education realized that if a crisis was to be averted the negro teacher must be removed, and at the afternoon session a white woman appeared and the pupils returned.

Leaves for New Station.

San Francisco, Sept. 26.—The first squadron of the First cavalry, which arrived from Manila by the last transport, left the Presidio today enroute to the new station at Fort Sam Houston, Tex., where they will join the Third squadron, which came over in May. The Second squadron, which is now on the way from Manila, will proceed to the same post on its arrival.

Young Girl Took Her Life.

Columbus, Ga., Sept. 26.—Miss Pearl Waters, a pretty young girl, only 16 years old, committed suicide in Girard, Ala., just across the river from Columbus, last night, by taking an overdose of morphine. Mistreatment by her father is said to be the cause of the act.

Proposed Big Combine.

New York, Sept. 26.—A meeting of leading car wheel manufacturers has been held in Atlantic City for the purpose of completing details of the proposed combination to be capitalized at \$9,000,000 with headquarters in New York. The corporation will be known as the National Car Wheel company.
