### TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

At Hamburg the women's congress debated the practice of wearing corsets and jewelry.

Although pressed not to call congress in extra session, President Roosevelt persists in his determination.

The militia of several states are taking part with the regulars in the war game being played in Kentucky.

Yellow fever is still epidemic at Laredo, Tex., but in the opinion of experts the situation has greatly improved.

At a meeting of pig iron makers of the south, at Birmingham, Ala., it was resolved to reduce the output 25 per cent.

Twenty-five witnesses were examined in the trial of Ernest Haywood for the murder of Ludlow Skinner, at Raleigh, N. C.

The committees on union of the Northern and Cumberland Presbyterians have adjourned without reaching an agreement.

The Macedonian revolutionary leaders assert that all the Christians in the town of Mehinia have been massacred by the Turks.

The Massachusetts Republicans have nominated Governor John Bates for a second term. President Roosevelt was endorsed and protection defended.

The honorable artillery company of London marched through Boston. The British flag flew at the Hub for the first time since the revolutionary days.

Attorney Dickinson, in presenting the case of the United States to the Alaskan boundary commission, ridiculed the contentions of the British counsel.

An attempt was made to prevent the execution of the Van Wormer brothers by forgery. A telegram purporting to be from President Roosevelt was sent to the warden forbidding the execution.

The resolutions introduced at the conference of conservative associations to approve Chamberlain's fiscal scheme was withdrawn. Premier Balfour said Chamberlain was the greatest colonial minister Great Britain had ever had.

Burglars entered the residence of W. H. Smithers, at Waynesville, N. C., and stole diamonds valued at \$2,000. Ladies seeing the burglars screamed and in their hurry to escape the burglars dropped the diamonds in the yard.

The advisory committee in charge of the affairs of Middendorf & Co., and John S. Williams & Sons states that the firms will emerge from the trouble stronger than ever. It is believed at Baltimore that the firms will retain control of the Seaboard.

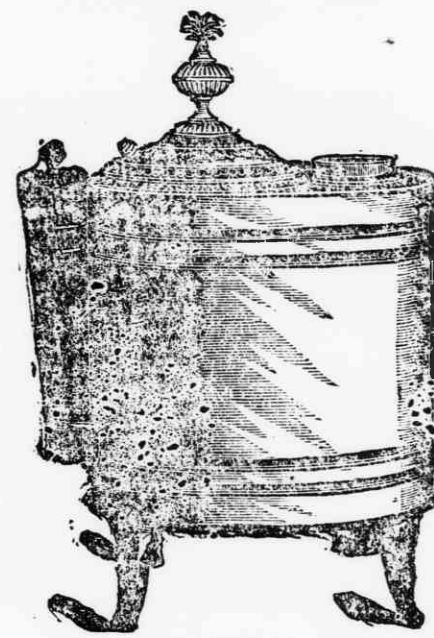
