Mrs. Moore is the First Vice President of the Woman's Home Mission Society of the Western North Carolina Conference and goes to Montgomery in the interest of the Industrial School and of appropriations for parsonages upon the weak circuits that have no homes for their preachers.

The spring term of Broad Valley Institute closed Friday, April 14. The attendance was not so large as usual for the spring term the enrollment being only thirty-seven. But nearly all who attended seemed eager to learn and made rapid advancement.
