## Asheville Letter

### A Batch of News Items from the Mountain Metropolis

From Our Regular Correspondent.

In the election held here on the question of whether Asheville should borrow \$10,700 to be used for the erection of a crematory for garbage, the measure passed by a small majority. A substantial majority was polled for the compulsory education law, which was practically the main issue of the election. The education law received a majority in every precinct except Asheville No. 2.

In a slide which occurred at the Balfour quarry recently T. R. Rice and Tom McKee, employees, were injured. A number of other men who were at work in the quarry at the time of the accident narrowly escaped with their lives. The two injured men were drilling when without warning a big portion of the rock cliff began to slide and the men were swept to the ground, a distance of about 20 feet. Rice had a rib broken and is thought to be hurt internally. McKee (reportedly) escaped with no bones broken but is said to be badly bruised and battered.

The little 4-year-old son of J. E. Bell of Haw Creek was brought to the city last week to have an operation performed in which the child had three fingers amputated. The child's hand was badly mangled while playing with a feed cutter in his father's barn, and it was found necessary to amputate the fingers. The youngster withstood the operation manfully and is reported to be getting along nicely.

The big concrete skeleton work of the hotel being erected on the site of the old "Buck" hotel on North Main street is now completed and for lack of ready funds to promote the completion of the building, work has been temporarily suspended by the heirs of the Smith estate. It is said that a stock company will be formed to have the building finished and operate same.

The Asheville coal famine is practically over and coal is now becoming plentiful. For a time matters had a serious aspect as coal was hard to get at any price. The people kicked to the local dealers but they said they were helpless, that the mine operators were unable to ship for lack of cars. This the Southern railway denies, and claims that it is the scheme of the miners to bid to the highest bidder and then cover up their misdoings by placing the blame on the railway, claiming that the railway is not rate coal and is not profitable in Asheville.

Viola Brown, daughter of M. Brownell of the town, was run over by a car of Patton avenue. She sustained a fracture of her leg, which is reported to be serious. The time of the

T. J. Hayes, the new traveling freight agent of the Southern has arrived in the city and assumed his duties.

Three new carriers and two extra clerks have been engaged by the Asheville post office so as to better facilitate the handling of the usual holiday mails. Postmaster Rollins reports that the cash receipts of his office for last month show an increase of 20 per cent over that of November, 1905.

Patrolman Sprouse, of Asheville's efficient police force went on record last week when he arrested a real live old white, venerable, long-eared, spindle-shanked, loitering, sheep-headed juckass on Pack Square for loafing. This is the first time that any of the four footed variety of Asheville's Pack Square loafers have been ensnared into the meshes of the law. L. R. D.
