John Bull and Peace.

It seems to be generally understood that Great Britain is anxious for peace, although going all lengths to be prepared for war. Perhaps her preparations mean that she aims to be the world's peacemaker and maintain peace if she has to fight for it. But now and then some trifle indicates that the power with endless dominions is ready to yield for the sake of peace. Not that she is really so very good all at once, but war is becoming fearfully expensive, and the average Briton, who gets no glory out of the game and foots all the bills, is kicking.

Not very long ago the British foreign office made known officially the fact that negotiations were going on to bring the British lion and the Russian bear into the traditional juxtaposition of the lion and the lamb, which spells the millennium. Encouraging reports in this line have leaked out since, and it may be that the next Hague conference will have a real triumph of the principle of arbitration to celebrate. It is said that the sultan of Turkey is on pins and needles for fear London and St. Petersburg are getting together on matters pertaining to the near east. Well he knows that the moment that takes place the crescent must come down from the mosque of St. Sofia at Constantinople and the Moslem power quit Europe bag and baggage. More than once of late he has imitated the horse sense of the coon in the sparring scene with Davy Crockett by crying: "Don't shoot. I'll come down," a clear indication that he no longer counts upon the quarrels of Turkey's European neighbors as the mainstay of the Turk. A treaty between Russia and Great Britain would be the first step in a quadruple alliance, France and Japan being the oph-

er factors. War against this combination would be foolhardy and the world's peace thereby assured.

Swim For Your Life and Your Health.

The long and harrowing chapter of drowning accidents which is a part of the outing season's history opened early this year. Several lives were lost in various parts of the country that with a little presence of mind, coupled with skill, might have been saved and perhaps never put in serious jeopardy. Most drowning accidents are due to lack of early education. The victims never learn to swim. Rescues are often made by persons younger and not so strong as the one in peril, and girls sometimes appear as the heroines of these exploits.

Swimming ought to be in the experience of every boy and girl. It may save the swimmer's own life and also the lives of others. Moreover, it is a healthy all around exercise. Muscles are developed in swimming, skill and presence of mind follow its practice as a matter of course, and proper swimming means proper breathing. The swimmer of a few strokes can keep afloat after falling overboard until other means of rescue can be had. And swimming is quicker learned than playing ball.
