## Asheville Letter

**NEWS NOTES FROM THE MOUNTAIN METROPOLIS OF INTEREST TO NEWS READERS.**

From Our Regular Correspondent.

At the present writing the Asheville police are going unpaid for the lack of funds to pay them their salaries. For some time past it has been the custom of the city treasurer to draw the money from the Battery Park bank semi-monthly and place it in the pay envelopes for the officers. This was done last Saturday, but when the warrant for the money was presented to Mayor Barnard for his signature he declined to sign it, stating that the city did not have the ready funds to pay the officers semi-monthly, this being only a courtesy extended the force for sometime past. He said further that he would be compelled to hold up the warrant for the money until the first of the month, which was the legal payday for the police force. Some of the officers are greatly embarrassed by the action of the mayor as they had promised payments on back bills they owed and also needed the money for current expenses. The mayor expressed his regrets for the stand he had taken, but said that he had no other course to pursue as the city did not have the money, and for that reason the payment would be deferred until the first of the month.

Announcement has been made that there will be another new electric railroad built in this county. The new road will run from Montreat to Biltmore and be parallel with the Swannanoa river. The survey for the new road is completed and the capital is ready to defray the expenses of the building. The right of ways must be given to the company gratis or they will not build. It is stated that they can not afford to pay for the right of way privilege, as the patronage of the road for years to come would hardly be sufficient to defray the expenses of operation. For this reason they do not feel justified to lay out a large amount of money for the right of way privileges. The road, if built, would naturally help the section through which it ran and enhance the value of the property on both sides of the right of way. Little opposition is expected when the road requests the right of way from the property owners.

According to a state law passed by the last legislature the "Jim Crow" law will be put in effect here in Asheville on the street cars and separate apartments on all the cars will be furnished for the whites and blacks. The law will apply to all public carriers throughout the entire state of North Carolina.

eighteen months each. Owing to their tender years they have been committed to the county home here in Buncombe county and in this way will escape a jail sentence.

Noah Walker, a young white man, an employe of the Hans Rees tannery, who was arrested last week by Police Sergeant Jackson, of Spartanburg, S. C., on the charge of murdering a woman in Tennessee has been released from custody. It has been proven conclusively that he was not the man wanted. It is now stated that Walker will sue Jackson for \$3,000 for false imprisonment and damage to his character. Later developments show that the only reason the officer had for arresting Walker was the fact that the murderer and Walker were both named Noah.

It is reported that Sam J. Taylor, of this city, the alleged bigamist, who married a young girl by the name of Clontz residing in Canton, N. C., and who had a wife living at the time, has been located. The couple eloped several weeks ago and went to Spar-

tanburg where the ceremony was performed. Shortly after the marriage the girl returned to her home in Canton but Taylor disappeared. The authorities all over the country were notified of the occurrence and it is said that they have gotten track of Taylor and that his capture is expected at any time.

A gentleman who is prominently identified with the Farager Company, who built the structural work of the Miller concrete hotel in this city, will be among the bidders for the property when the court places the hotel on sale at public auction again. If the Farager company succeed in getting the hotel they will complete it and then lease same. In this manner they hope to get out of the hole in which they are in. It is stated from the same source that the Farager company have at least \$60,000 tied up in the building as it now stands. To buy in the hotel and complete it would be the only way that they could get their money back.

A novel plan has been instituted by the Forestry depart-

ment of the Biltmore estate to protect the forest and game on the estate of George W. Vanderbilt, in the Mills River section of Henderson county. Dr. C. A. Schenck, head of the forestry department, has deposited a check in the Commercial Bank of Hendersonville for the sum of \$120. The check is made payable to the township of Mills River, to be used for a charitable or public purpose; providing that by November 1st, 1907, no trespassing has occurred on the lands of George W. Vanderbilt, in Mills river township, from the date of deposit to November 1st, 1907. Payment will not be made if the woods are fired or there is any fishing or hunting done on the estate by the people of the Mills River section. The Forestry department hope by this unique method of offering a prize to the people of the township to secure their co-operation and protect the property from trespassers.
