By virtue of the power and authority conferred upon me as executor of the last will and testament of Mrs. C. C. Shuford, deceased, which last will and testament has been admitted to probate in the said county of Transylvania, and is now on record in the office of the Clerk of the Superior Court of said county, I will, on Tuesday, the 27th day of August, 1907, between the hours of 12 o'clock m. and 2 o'clock p. m., sell at public auction, to the highest bidder, for cash, at the court house door, in the Town of Brevard, in the said county of Transylvania and state of North Carolina, the undivided half interest of the said Mrs. C. C. Shuford, or of which she died seized, in and to the following pieces, tracts or boundaries of land, situated in the said county of Transylvania, and state of North Carolina, on the waters of the French Broad river, and more particularly described and bounded as follows:

First Tract—Adjoining the lands of the Breese heirs and others. Beginning on a maple at the line ditch in Hume and Shuford's line and runs north 73 poles to a stake near the mouth of a small ditch; thence north 25 deg east with the ditch 8 poles to a stake in the bend of the ditch; thence north 27 deg west 35 poles to a black oak; thence north 45 deg west 44 poles to a stake in a hollow at the new road; thence with the new road leading from Brevard to Island Ford bridge a north-easterly direction, 79 poles to a gap in the mountain at the old road, to a small white oak on the bank of the road; thence north 74 deg west 12 poles to a white oak, the corner of the school house tract; thence north 79 deg west 23 poles to a spanish oak; thence north 77 deg west 10 poles to a spanish oak; thence north 44 deg west 12 poles to a stake; thence north 66 deg west 16 poles to a hickory; thence north 86 deg west 8 poles to a chestnut on top of Highlow mountain, corner of James Duckworth's land; thence south 52 deg west down a ridge 32 poles to a stake and pointers; thence south 25 deg west down a ridge 14 poles to a spanish oak; thence south 17 deg west down a ridge a conditional line 38 poles to a stake in Carson's line; thence east with Carson's line 60 poles to his corner; thence south with Carson's line 144 poles to his corner; thence with a ditch, a conditional line between this land and the land of the Breese heirs, to the beginning. Containing 100 acres more or less.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY.

BREVARD, N. C., Aug. 6, 1907.

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners of Transylvania County:

We the undersigned members of the Finance Committee of the county would respectfully report that we have made a careful examination of the financial records of the county from December 2, 1902, to Aug. 6, 1907.

From this examination we find the following to be the true amount due the various funds of the county:

Table with 2 columns: Fund Name, Amount. Includes General school fund (\$3,962.79), Railroad fund (975.19), Bridge fund (321.03), Pauper fund (119.07), Contingent fund (855.01), Stock law fund (92.01).

Making a total of \$6,325.07. Special school fund overdr'n 56.66

Leaving a balance due the county of \$6268.41

This amount (\$6,268.41) we find the Treasurer has on hand subject to the order of the county.

While the report must be most gratifying to every citizen of the county, there are some facts that presented themselves to your committee in the course of its investigation that we desire to recommend in the most urgent language we can command.

1st. It is absolutely necessary that the office of the County Superintendent of Education and the office of the Treasurer be provided with books suitable for a permanent record. Their offices are at present supplied with cheap memoranda books of inferior quality and very insecurely bound.

2nd. A strict compliance of all the officers with Section 1398, Subsection 2 and 5 of the Revisal of 1905, and with Sections 4154 and 4157 of the School Law is imperatively necessary, in order to avoid confusion and errors. The following are the laws:

Sec. 1398, Subsection 2. To keep a true account of the receipts and expenditures of all such moneys, taking proper vouchers in every case in books provided for that purpose at the expense of the county, which said books shall at all times show the date, amount, and from whom he shall have received such moneys; the date, amount and to whom he has paid out any of the said moneys, the total amount received and the total amount paid out during the current fiscal year for school purposes, for general county purposes, for jury fund, and for each special purpose, all separately kept, so that at all times his said books shall correctly and accurately show the condition of the said several accounts. His account of expenditures for general county purposes shall also show separately the amounts expended each year on account of the county home, indigent persons, jails, work-houses, court-house, bridges, insolvent fees, courts, and such other special accounts as shall be required by the Board of Commissioners of the county, the total of said accounts being the aggregate amount expended during the fiscal year for general county purposes. He shall post at the courthouse door on the first Monday in each month a correct statement of such receipts and expenditures, showing the amount received, and from what source, and the amounts paid out, and to whom, and for what purpose, and the balance in his hands belonging to the county.

Subsection 5. To exhibit his books and accounts and moneys once every three months, or oftener, if the Board of Commissioners of his county deem it necessary, to a committee to be composed of the chairman of the Board of Commissioners and one other person to be selected by the Board of Commissioners, who shall be an expert accountant, and it shall be the duty of this committee to examine the books and accounts of his office, and to see that the accounts are correctly and promptly kept, and to count the money in the hands of the Treasurer, and to see that it corresponds with the amount shown by the books to be in his hands. And at every such examination of the books and accounts of his office the county treasurer shall exhibit a full, perfect and itemized statement to said committee of the use he has made of every dollar of public funds in his hands since the last exhibition of his books to said committee, and if any part of said funds has been loaned out this statement shall state to whom loaned and on what security, and the amount of interest paid on said loan, and such interest shall be by the treasurer covered into the county treasury. This statement shall be sworn to and published in a county newspaper or at the courthouse door: Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize the county treasurer to lend any public funds. And if at any time there shall be a deficit in the amount of money in the hands of the treasurer, the committee shall so report to the Board of Commissioners, whose duty it shall be to institute

proceedings in the superior court against said treasurer for violation of his official duties.

Sec. 4154. The treasurer of the county school funds shall keep a book in which shall be entered a full and detailed account of all public school moneys received by him, the name of each person paying him school money, the source from which the same may have been derived, and the date of such payment. In his settlement with the sheriff or other collecting officer of public school funds the treasurer shall receive money only.

Sec. 4157. It shall be the duty of the treasurer of the county school fund to keep a book in which he shall open an account with each township in the county, showing the amount apportioned to such township by the County Board of Education. He shall also open an account with each school district showing the amount apportioned to such district. He shall record all payments of school money, giving the date, the amount, the person to whom paid, and for what purpose paid. He shall balance the account of each township and district annually, on the thirtieth of June, and shall report by letter or printed circular within ten days thereafter such balances to the County Board of Education and to the school committee.

If these laws are, strictly complied with the auditing of the accounts of the county can be done in a very short time.
