After a session of 160 days the first legislature of Oklahoma has adjourned sine die.

The Aero Club of California, the first organization of this kind in the state, was formed at Los Angeles. The club has twenty-five charter members.

A committee of the council of the empire, by a vote of 27 to 14, adopted the proposals for the construction of the Amur railway, as passed by the Russian duma.

As a result of several conferences between President Roosevelt, Sec. Taft and General Bell, chief of staff of the army, it has been decided not to withdraw any of the United States troops from Cuba at the present time.

District Attorney John F. Clarke, of Brooklyn, will sail for Italy on June 6th to study the Italian criminal where he grows. Mr. Clarke will be accompanied by Francis L. Gorrao, one of his assistants, who was born in Italy.

President J. T. Harahan, of the Illinois Central, has sailed for Europe on a trip which, according to reports, is intended, at least in part, to bring about friendlier relations between the Illinois Central management and some of its stockholders, among whom an anti-Harriman campaign was waged during the contest over the last annual election.

At the annual meeting of the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic surgeons, at Brunswick, Ga., Atlanta was selected for the 1909 session.

Personal telegrams from Denver, Colo., to C. O. Johnson, of Atlanta, Ga., announce the death of R. J. Murphy, for years a resident and a widely known cigar and tobacco dealer.

A wage scale operative until March 31, 1909, affecting about 40,000 miners in the Pittsburgh district, has been signed. The agreement is the same as the one in force two years ago.

In a four-handed lawn tennis match at Queen's Club, Eustace H. Miles and V. H. Pennell, the English players, vanquished Jay Gould and Chas. E. Sands, of New York, 3 sets to 2. The Americans took the first two sets.

A New York dispatch says that Rev. L. Ward Brigham, pastor of All Souls' Universalist church of Flatbush, has refused an increase in salary. It is said the increase will be made in spite of the protest.

The syndicate which is arranging for the visit to Australia of "Tommy" Burns, the heavyweight pugilist, has deposited \$10,000 to bind the match between Burns and Lang, the Australian boxer. The fight is to take place at Sydney, Australia, in August.

Four Men Killed by Explosion. Lisbon, O., May 28.—In a mine explosion at Salinesville, near here, three men were killed outright, and one man was killed by a falling pipe after he had been dragged out of the mine by the rescuers.

Walter Satterlee, the artist, died at his home in New York city, after a week's illness. Mr. Satterlee was sixty-five years old.

The crop damage throughout north west Missouri resulting from continued rains is heavy. Much corn has been washed out or has rotted.

The Greek steamer Lamyron, bound for Copenhagen, has been wrecked on the rocks three miles from Cape Finistere. The crew was rescued by another bark.

James Hart, a negro, on trial for the murder of Sergeant Oscar Gatling, of Fort Barrancas, Fla., was found guilty in the federal court of manslaughter. The jury was out 12 hours.

Mrs. Mary Hinton, formerly of London, England, once a frequent contributor to English and American magazines, committed suicide at her home in Washington, D. C., by asphyxiation. It is said. She was fifty-three years of age.

The British punitive expedition has ended its campaign against the warring Mohmand tribesmen, and on Sunday Major General Willcocks will return to Indian territory and demobilize his forces.

The cemented vestibule floor of the Lithuanian church of Our Lady of Vilna in Chicago gave way as a large congregation was leaving. Thirty persons were thrown into the basement and a panic resulted. None, however, suffered worse injuries than cuts and bruises.

Dynamiters wrecked the big pipe that conveys water from the Bonita mountains, in New Mexico, to Garriozzo, N. M., where all the engines of the El Paso and Southwestern railway system are supplied. This pipe line, which diverts the entire water supply of the Bonita river, cost about one million dollars.

Ten persons have died from the excessive heat in Pittsburg, Pa.

In fighting the Aldrich bill Senator LaFollette held the floor over twelve hours.

An issue of \$12,750,000 in 4 1/2 per cent sinking fund bonds of the National Railways of Mexico is announced. The bonds will run for fifty years.

Peru is negotiating for the purchase of the Italian third-class protected cruiser Punita, which it is desired to convert into a naval school ship.
