"Little Joe" Brown, who was chosen by the sovereign voters of Georgia as their chief executive, is fifty-seven years of age and the son of Georgia's war governor In politics he is a democrat; in re-

ligion a Baptist.

He is descended from Scotch-Irish Protestante, who came to this country in the seventeenth century. His ancestors were hardy, honest and true men. His father was a contemporary of such illustrious Georgians as Lucius Q. C. Lamar, Thomas R. R. Cobb, Benjamin Harvey Hill, Robert G. Harper and Linton Stephens.

Governor-elect Joseph M. Brown inherits many of his father's traits. He is calm, deliberate, slow in making up his mind, but determined and untiring once, he is satisfied as to his

The experiences of Joseph M. Brown as laborer, law student, railroader, business man and farmer, should qualify him to appreciate the struggles and sympathize with the needs of every class of Georgia citizens.

He has had a taste of almost every field of business activity. He is a profound student, an author, a business mar and a farmer.
