THE BANNER SCHOOL.

Oak Forest (Green Town) 80 Per Cent.

Last week's reports show almost a tie between English Chapel school and Qak Forest, each making an average attendance for the week of 80 per cent. of the census. The only difference between the two schools is in the percent. of the enrollment in actual daily attendance, English Chapel averaging 89.6 per cent. of the enrollment, while Oak Forest averaged 94 per cent.

English Chapel school, as was stated last week, is taught by Miss Mary Rankin, of Greenville, Tenn. Oak Forest school is taught by John L. Waldrop of Selica.

Miss Rankin raised her average last week over what it was the week before from 77 per cent. of the census and 86 per cent. of the enrollment to 80 per cent. of the census and 89.6 per cent. of the enrollment, and Mr. Waldrop raised his from 69.5 per cent. of the census and 81 per cent. of the enrollment to 80 per cent. of the census and 94 per cent. of the enrollment.

The third school in the list is Carson Creek school, District No. 4, Dunns Rock township, taught by Miss Sue Glazener of Brevard, in which there was an average attendance of 71.4 per cent. of the census and 85.2 per cent. of the en-

There was one school in the county where the average attendance was only 34 per cent. of the census. 
