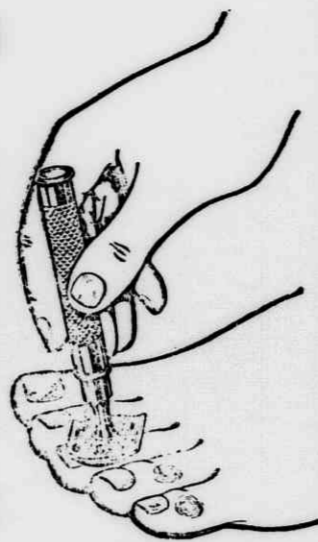

THE PARADE OF SCHOOL CHILDREN
