The plague carried off 300,000 in Naples in 1656. In 1666 68,596 died in London out of a population of 460,000,

The final action of the board was the decision to notify all property owners or occupants of property which is in an unsanitary condition to immediately provide themselves with garbage barrels or boxes into which shall be gathered all trash and refuse of all kinds now littering the premises, these barrels or Davidson college. For many years boxes to be placed in the street in now Mrs. Jackson has made her front of the different houses by Friday morning of this week. At that time a wagon employed by the town will go the rounds and haul away the accumulated trash.

> Thereafter it will be required that all garbage and trash be dumped into receptacles and placed in the street for collection by the wagon each Wednesday and Saturday morning. The wagon will not be able to cover the entire residential section of the town on each of these days and so the board requests that all private houses having trash to be hauled will notify the officers on the days preceeding the days for the wagon to make its rounds and such notffication will have prompt attention.

It was found that the taxable property within the incorporation limits will this year be approximately \$500,000, an increase of about \$65,000. In view of this the board decided to fix the tax rate for this year at eighty cents on the hundred and the poll tax at \$1.75. This is a reduction of ten cents on the hundred and twenty-five cents

on the poll. This news will doubtless prove most welcome to the citizens of the town.

Automobiles in Brevard will hereafter be required to reduce their speeds to a point conducive to the safety of the pedestrians. The board passed an ordinance decreeing that no machine within the town shall exceed ten miles an hour, the penalty for the violation being fixed at not less than \$25 nor more than \$100.

Another ordinance was passed forbidding any raffling schemes, the penalty for violation being fixed at \$10.

taxes in the town for this year was made practically the same as last year with a few exceptions.

The tax of one per cent on the gross business of express, telegraph and telephone companies is not allowed this year under the general state machinery act, so a privilege tax of \$10 per year was fixed upon. these businesses.

The same tax on electric light and electric power companies was changed to a privilege tax on each. of \$25.

On real estate agencies the privilege tax was fixed at \$5 for the head of the firm and \$2 upon each additional member of the firm, or in case of an individual dealer \$5.

A tax of \$5 on street merchants was added to the schedule, and the old privilege taxes fixed upon building contractors and fertilizer dealers were repealed.

With the exceptions mentioned the list in force last year stands for this year.

The water committee reported an abundance of water and the system in good condition. The light committee reported trouble with several of the street arcs, some of these having failed to burn several nights. This will be investigated. The finance committee reported a balance of cash on hand of about one hundred dollars.

The board completed its work and adjourned about one o'clock.

The Adder's Poison. One of the most wonderful things in nature is the arrangement of the teeth in the mouth of the common adder or viper.
