LIME FOR SOILS

An investigation made by President Finley of the Southern railway system has shown that experts in the chemistry of soils are unanimously of the opinion that lime in some form will benefit many soils of the southeastern states by correcting their acidity and improving their mechanical condition.

President Finley has secured the opinions of experts throughout the southern states and also in the eastern and middle states, in some of which experiments with the use of lime have been carried on for a long series of years. These opinions have been published in an illustrated folder which is being widely distributed among the farmers in the territory traversed by the lines of the Southern railway system.
