The Foreign Association Pageant eld on May 15th was one of the nost successful and interesting pro-

was ander the anspicas of the $Y$. W. and Y. M. C. A.. and was coached by Mrs. Trowbridge and Miss Kennedy. Nearly all the divisions of the pageant were cleverly staged and acted, showing caizeful coaching and much native talent.
The pageant was inangurated by a beautifnl prologne by Miss Clara Seatherwood, , representing the Spirit of Progress. Following this
