He served in the Confederate 6 00 army with courage and distinctinction, and in all his-dealings with his friends and neighbors his conduct has been marked by honesty 25 00 and fair dealing. Mr. Shuford was a native of this county, a son of David and Sarah Shuford. He has been twice married, first to Miss Julia A. Hood, on June 17, 1875, who died on the 19th day of September, 1895. He was again married on the 11th day of November. 1897, to Miss Ursula A. Siniard, a daughter of Captain Lee Siniard of this county.
