CARTER ASBURY SHUFORD

Mr. C. A. Shuford died at his home in Brevard last Monday night after an illness of several months. At the time of his death he was about seventy-eight years of age.

He served in the Confederate army with courage and distinction, and in all his dealings with his friends and neighbors his conduct has been marked by honesty and fair dealing. Mr. Shuford was a native of this county, a son of David and Sarah Shuford. He has been twice married, first to Miss Julia A. Hood, on June 17, 1875, who died on the 19th day of September, 1895. He was again married on the 11th day of November, 1897, to Miss Ursula A. Siniard, a daughter of Captain Lee Siniard of this county. Mr. Shuford was never blessed with children, and he was the last of his immediate family.

The funeral services were conducted from the Methodist church Wednesday morning by Rev. Loy D. Thompson, assisted by Rev. C. M. Carpenter, and the interment was at the Davidson River cemetery.

The following were the pall bearers: O. L. Erwin, Cos Paxton, Welch Galloway, Branch Paxton, F. E. B. Jenkins and J. W. Duckworth.

MRS. ANDREW K. ORR

Mrs. A. K. Orr died at her home in Asheville last Thursday afternoon following an illness of two months. For several days before her death her relatives realized that she was in a very dangerous condition and but little hope was entertained for recovery.

Mrs. Orr was a native of Pittsburg, Pa., and was Miss Elizabeth Dalzell before her marriage to Mr. Orr. Mrs. Orr came from Pittsburg with her husband to Brevard about six years ago and made this her home for a short time, afterwards removing to Asheville. She was a woman of strong character and made many friends while here. At the time of her death she was about forty-two years of age. She is survived by her husband and two children, Andrew K. Orr, Jr. and Miss Mary Orr.

Mr. Orr is division freight agent for the Southern railway, with headquarters in Asheville, and also secretary of the Transylvania Railroad company. He has many friends in Transylvania county who will be grieved to learn of his great loss.

Funeral services were conducted from the residence of the deceased last Friday afternoon and the interment was at Riverside cemetery, Dr. J. C. Rowe, pastor of Central Methodist church, officiating. The pall bearers were Messrs. O. M. Coston, F. S. Kennett, H. E. Burns, James H. Wood, A. F. Hall and Joseph Sluder.

BREVARD INSTITUTE NOTES

The Foreign Association Pageant held on May 15th was one of the most successful and interesting programs ever given in the Institute. It was under the auspices of the Y. W. and Y. M. C. A., and was coached by Mrs. Trowbridge and Miss Kennedy. Nearly all the school participated and the various divisions of the pageant were cleverly staged and acted, showing careful coaching and much native talent.

The pageant was inaugurated by a beautiful prologue by Miss Clara Leatherwood, representing the Spirit of Progress. Following this Chinese songs were rendered by the Y. M. C. A. chorus as a prelude to the first division of the pageant—"China"—the keynote of the act being "The Association—a Physical Aid." There were two scenes in costume in which Miss Huntley as Chun Ming Yu, a Chinese student; Miss Leatherwood as Miss Ting, Chinese secretary; Miss Whitaker as Dr. Wu, Chinese doctor; Miss Willis as Amah, Chinese servant, carried the roles with honor. The scenes were laid in Shanghai, Miss Ting's office and the association gymnasium.

The second division, of which the keynote was "The Association—a Financial Aid," was "India." It was precluded by Hindoo songs by the Y. M. C. A. chorus.

There were two scenes (in costume) in this act, each showing the interior of a Hindoo home, in which Miss Smith as the Hindoo Christian-mother, with her daughters, Ambu and Kuribai, Misses Carter and Brintle, Miss Brown as Miss Everett, association secretary, did very effective work, as did also the 'child widows.'

As a prelude to the third division, "South America," Miss Coville played the Argentine national hymn most effectively. The keynote of this division was "The Association—the Travelers' Aid." It was cleverly costumed and acted by Miss Callahan, as general secretary; Miss Willis, assistant secretary; Miss Carter, a French girl; Miss Galloway, an English girl; Miss Brown, an American girl. The scene was laid in the general office of the association at Buenos Aires.

The Y. M. C. A. chorus opened the fourth division, "Japan," with Japanese songs. The keynote of this division was "The Association—a Spiritual Aid." Misses Huntley, Matheson, Whitaker, Brown and Willis as delegates to the summer conference were very fetching in their Japanese costumes and did clever work, Miss Callahan as American secretary and Miss Carter as Japanese secretary were entirely satisfactory. The scene was the student summer conference at Kugenuma. The Epilogue, "Association Spirit," was personified by Miss Grist, before whom knelt representative converts from the various mission fields all bearing banners and wearing native costumes. These were grouped about her and were joined by a procession of white-robed missionary workers. When the circle was complete Miss Wells struck a few chords and an anthem set
