SILU REDUCES FEED COST

How to Build a Good One With Ordinary Farm Tools Told in Southern Railway Folder.

How the average farmer, using ordinary farm tools, at an expense of only \$65.00 can construct a silo with a capacity of 55 tons—enough silage to feed 20 cows 40 pounds per day for four months—is told in a booklet just gotten out by the Live Stock Department of the Southern Railway, a copy of which will be mailed free to any farmer addressing request for same to Mr. F. L. Word, Live Stock Agent, Southern Railway Building, Atlanta, Ga.

"Where there is Live Stock on the Farm There Should be a Silo" is the title of this booklet which tells of the advantage to the farmer of having a silo and the great saving which it enables him to make in the cost of winter feeding for his live stock. The figures given are taken from the practical experience of a Tennessee farmer who built a silo on the lines indicated twenty years ago, who finds it as good as new today, and feels that it has paid for itself many times over every year.

Secretary of Agriculture Wilson has recently declared that the Southeastern states constitute the ideal section of the United States for live stock raising and must be looked to in future years for the nation's food supply. To stimulate interest in the live stock industry and to aid farmers to successfully follow this line, the Southern Railway has established its Live Stock Department which is giving undivided attention to this work.

Good Roads in Durham.

Durham—The county road force has completed that part of the central highway in Durham county and when Orange county connects with this road leading out of West Durham there will be a good road from this city to Greensboro. One gang of the convict force is now working on the Durham end of the Quebec and Miami road, which is known as the Oxford road. It will take something like three months to get a four-mile gap in this road put into the proper condition for travel.

Held On Serious Charge.

Greensboro—W. C. Tise, a Winston-Salem business man, and his stenographer, Miss Lillie Tess, are under bonds of \$400 to appear in police court and answer to charges of immorality. Some time ago the woman came to Greensboro and took apartments and to her a child was born. After the birth, man, woman and child left in an automobile. The child was left with a woman in the suburbs of Winston-Salem, where it died. Investigation when a burial certificate was requested furnished the clue.

To Start Drainage Work.

Fayetteville.—The Breatt Engineering & Construction Co. of Wilson has been awarded the contract to do the excavating work in connection with the drainage of the swamp lands of Flea Hill township. The work will be begun as soon as the commissioners of the drainage district sell the bonds. The property will be assessed according to the classification of the lands which will be made before the sale of the bonds. The Brett Company was given the contract at 6.37 cents the cubic yard.
