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MIXED TIGRET ELECTED

The results of Tuesday's election show what may be called a sweeping Republican victory, although at some points along the line the Democrats held their own. The tabulated returns, published in this issue, tell the story in cold figures.

While the Republicans are rejoicing over a great victory, the fact is that the relative positions are about the same as they were after the election of ,1912. The office of clerk of court, which was not in the contest at that time, will still be held by a Democrat. N. A. Miller, the Democratic candidate, had a clear majority over A. E. Hampton, the Republican candidate. At this writing Cedar Mountain has not been heard from, but its returns cannot materially affect the results already obtained. Two Democrats, T. S. Wood and G. T. Lyday, have been elected along with one Republican, W. L. Talley, on the board of county commissicers. C. R. Sharp was elected surveyor on the Democratic ticket.

Ontside of these four democrats the county has gone republican. A glance at the totals will show that everywhere along the line the contest was very close. No candidate need feel ashamed of the votes he

Tuesday was an ideal day for out-of-doors. All day long candidates and workers of both parties gathered in knots on the streets and in every available spot. At one time in the day the hopes of the democrats were high, and prophesies were confident. But Brevard township always relied on as strongly democratic, showed de cided republican gains in the final count. The increase in population of the last two years has been largely in favor of the latter party.

At night the street scenes showed the festivity of a gala occasion. Democrats and republicans mingled their voices in shout and song, most festive danced the "Highland" fling and cut the pigeon wing and generally kept the onlookers in a state of bilarity. On both sides of Main street and down the middle were numbers of ladies who had come out to patronize the Betterment oyster supper, but who did not fail to take in the political spectacle.

To add to the interest of the evening the Brevard Amusement Company threw some of the returns on a sheet stretched on the walls on the south side of Main street, and also gave free picture shows on the same street.
