"THE BUILDER OF BRIDGES"

Next Tuesday night, September 14, "The Builder of Bridges" will be presented at the Auditorium. Following is a synopsis of the play: Edward Thursfield, chief engineer of the bridge construction firm of Henry Killick & Company, returns from the field and is introduced to Arnold Faringay, a young man recently placed in charge of his accounts. Arnold is a member of a respected family. His sister, Dorothy, is entrusted in their father's will with the care of Arnold and their young sister Ruth, and the responsibility of their heavily mortgaged house.

Arnold has become attracted by the glowing stories of a chief named Welch, formerly employed in the same office but discharged for gambling. Becoming deeply involved, Arnold takes twenty thousand dollars from the payroll, charging it to Thursfield's account for the huge bridge. The chief engineer's return drives Arnold to desperation. He is unable to borrow the necessary money from Walter Gresham, his sister Dorothy's fiance, who refuses to save him. Arnold returns to his home and is about to end it all when his sister Dorothy finds him and wrenches the revolver from his hand. This leads to a confession from Arnold, and Dorothy sees the name of Faringay in danger of exposure.

Dorothy, learning that Thursfield is the real power in his firm, believes her only hope of saving Arnold lies in following the engineer to Atlantic City, the site of a plan he is to construct. They meet and playing upon his sympathy, she leads him to propose. Drawn by his wonderful power she actually falls in love with him.

Thursfield returns to check up his accounts and finds the alterations. In a series of tense, dramatic scenes, Arnold is forced to confess. Thursfield, for the sake of his fiance, pays the shortage, discharging Arnold, who, meeting Walter Gresham, tells him that the loan he had asked has been paid by a friend.

Gresham receives a note from Dorothy breaking their engagement. He rushes to Dorothy's house and there finding her in Thursfield's arms, demands an explanation. Dorothy introduces Thursfield as her fiance, whereupon Walter, surmising this to be the friend who paid the money, denounces her as having seduced Thursfield's love to save her brother. Forced to admit the truth of this, Thursfield refuses to believe her further confession that she has really grown to love him, and leaves her, telling Arnold that he will not prosecute and that his sister has won her game.

Arnold proves able to redeem himself and Dorothy goes to Thursfield's apartment to return the money, which he at first refuses to accept. Realizing the truth as his gaze searches deep into her eyes, he takes her in his arms, forgiving her.
