RIDDICK PRESIDENT A. & M.

Native North Carolinian Is Elected President of College—Has Been Vice-President.

Raleigh.—Wallace Carl Riddick was elected president of the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, a state institution, now having more than 600 cadets in attendance. The new president succeeds Dr. D. H. Hills, who resigns to write a history of North Carolina in the War Between the States, funds having been provided for that work.

President Riddick is 52 years old, a native of North Carolina, and has been vice president of the college for a number of years. He became the head of the department of civil engineering in 1892 and is a graduate of Wake Forest College, the University of North Carolina and Lehigh University.

Attend Women's Military Camp.

Washington.—Congressman John H. Small, whose two daughters have been attending the women's camp for study of military matters at Cheney Chase, went to the closing of the camp. Mr. Small is greatly impressed with the results of the work which women have been engaged in the past few weeks, believing it will bear results of much benefit to all who attend.

Among some of the inconveniences experienced by the campers were the lack of mirrors and high heeled shoes. A large percentage of the women are suffering from sore heels. Mirrors have been luxuries inasmuch as there have been numerous scrambles by parties of four and six to get the use of few mirrors available.

Congressman Small has been a steadfast supporter of preparedness and believes the training camp for women one of the foremost methods.

Packing House for Wilmington.

Wilmington.—Wilmington is to have a packing house. A committee has been appointed by the chamber of commerce to "take hold of the packing house proposition, and put it through on a basis of not less than \$100,000 for the plant and an additional \$100,000 for working capital." The following were appointed as a committee to take up the matter and also to recommend a capable management: Messrs. W. W. Love, chairman; H. C. McQueen, M. J. Corbett, G. Herbert Smith and John H. Brown.

Asheville to Celebrate Flag Day.

Asheville.—Asheville is preparing to celebrate Flag Day, June 14, with a great preparedness parade, at which time the facilities of the Mountain Metropolitan, as well as the willingness of her people to defend their country, will be shown. Large motor trucks will be in the line, showing Asheville's facilities for getting supplies to her troops, and a number of other features will be arranged. The Flag Day celebration promises to become an annual event.

Treating Pyromaniac Girl.

Kinston, Novella Chase, the 13 year old girl who started a fire in a store and a half of fires in seven days' time in the home of her father, T. W. Chase, a farm tenant, and who was arrested after she had burned down the home of a brother-in-law living nearby, is now an inmate of the C. W. Well Training School, the state institution for the feeble-minded, near here. She is to undergo treatment for the mania which impelled her to attempt to destroy with fire everything around her.

New Movie Star.

Wilmington.—Miss Louisa Daniels, daughter of Mr. C. W. Worth of Wilmington, and niece of Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, has become a motion picture player, and friends here have been much interested to learn within the past few days that she is moving with great success in New York. Miss Worth took the leading role in "For Uncle Sam's Navy," which was recently produced by a big film corporation.

Furniture Makers Meet.

Statesville.—North Carolina furniture manufacturers, to the number of 20 or more, representing 15 of the larger furniture manufacturers of the state held a conference here. The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the increased cost of material and if possible determine what course the factories should pursue for their protection.

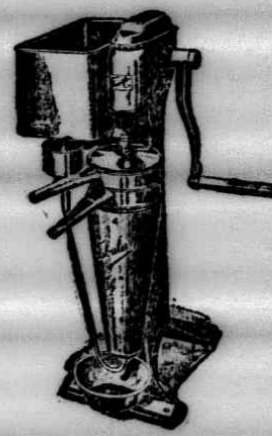
NORTH CAROLINA BRIEFS.

A 15 per cent increase in the iron ore mined in North Carolina was recorded in 1915 over 1914, according to a report made public by the geological survey. The state mined 66,453 long tons in 1915 and 57,567 in 1914.

The East Liverpool, O., pottery interests, who are now establishing a pottery at Erwin, East Tennessee, with a capital of some \$200,000, will depend in the main upon clays and feldspar that are mined in North Carolina.

The historic beech tree, near the North Carolina-Tennessee boundary line, known as the "Boone Tree," on which Daniel Boone, the famous pioneer American hunter, carved the information that he had killed a bear, has at last yielded to the elements, after having withstood the storms of time dating back to the earliest period of our national life. This tree was blown down by fierce wind recently and split in two, so that the historic inscription in its bark, which read, "D. Boone killed bear on tree in year 1769," is severed.

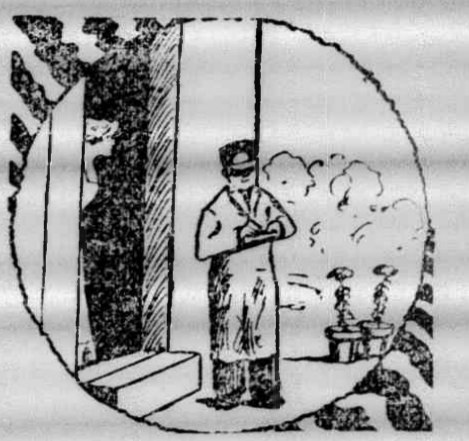
