It is seldom the farmers of Transylvania experience such depressing circumstances as have been occasioned by the storm of the past week. The losses of the farmers on the rivers have been unusually heavy and if they ever needed sympathy and consolation in their farm troubles, it is now. While such disastrous floods seldom visit this section, this one, if it serves no other good purpose, will long hold a place in the minds of bottom-land farmers and serve as a warning against such heavy losses from probable overflows, especially in harvest time.

## Progressive Road Building.

The county commissioners are to be congratulated upon their decision to adopt a plan of road building whereby they will receive the services of a state engineer without cost and a sum of money from the government equal to that the county spends in permanent road building.

The News is glad the county authorities can see their way clear to enter upon road building on a permanent basis. With good roads Transylvania will not suffer. Farmers will benefit thereby and the county will be filled with sightseers from the warmer climes during the summer.

Without good roads we are by reason of keen competition obliged to take a back seat.

The commissioners have shown remarkably good judgment that should bear good fruit.

The commissioners are also to be congratulated for their refusal to jump from one section of the county to another for short periods with the convict camp, which is a very expensive proposition when it comes to moving.

## Transylvania's Prohibition Measure.

In counties where the political strength is about evenly divided, as it is in Transylvania, there is never a dearth of issues, planks and platforms to which the political parties commit themselves and since there is a biennial habit of resolving in this county, the prohibition phase of the approaching campaign, judging from the communication elsewhere in the News, promises to become embarrassing.

It is difficult to make a party issue of this matter since Representative C. B. Deaver, republican, was the author of this bill, which, we understand, found no opposition at the hands of Senator Cos Paxton, democrat. The bill was passed at the request of about 700 petitioners, representing about half the constituency of the county.

Under the circumstances it would be embarrassing for either party to repudiate and condemn the action of its senator or representative backed by such a large number of petitioners and since the political conventions have a custom of resolving on such matters there are many with strong prohibition persuasion who would like to see the measure endorsed, though there would be opposition by others. To ignore the matter leaves it in the hands of the county representative and there are those in both parties who would dislike to have a candidate with decidedly anti-prohibition convictions, because he would be calculated to prove disastrous to the good things already accomplished for Transylvania.

Our prohibition law is decidedly a good one, just what the whole State needs and will ultimately have and the candidate who comes out for the legislature and commits himself against it, regardless of political party, is entitled to nothing short of defeat.

It is well enough to let a good thing alone. Tinkering with this matter by either political party other than by endorsement is calculated to stir up the prohibitionists to the point where a prohibition party will be born, for there are no few people in Transylvania, we are proud to say, who will lay aside political convictions before they will support a wet measure or a wet candidate for the legislature.

It is a moral question devoid of political aspects and therefore should be regarded as such. If any of the News readers care to express their convictions in public print, either for or against prohibition legislation, we trust that they will feel free to do so, but with a reasonable number of words.

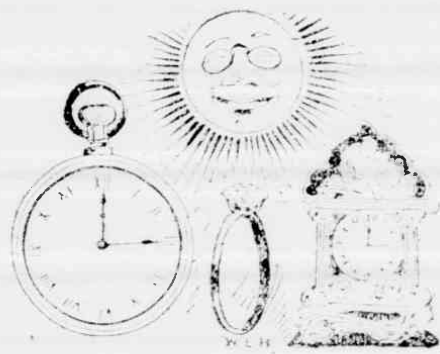
