JONES GAP ROAD BADLY DAMAGED BY HEAVY RAINS

The Greenville News tells of serious damage by rains to the Jones Gap road, on which permanent improvements will not be made before fall, when it is understood the convicts will be placed on this road so as to make a fit highway to Brevard.

The article in Tuesday's News of last week follows:

"As a result of the heavy rains for the past three or four days, it was reported to the supervisor Sunday and yesterday that the Jones Gap road has been almost washed away.

"At Cagle's bridge, sometimes called 'long' bridge the river had cut its course across the road, rising above the bridge, and the buttress at the far side had been immersed so far that it was impossible to estimate the strength of the remaining timbers.

"Other such demolishments were reported by parties who 'braved it' from the Head and Cedar Mountain. Several automobiles that attempted to go up Saturday night met pointblank impediments.

"Several bridges near Drake's Inn were reported to be demolished.

"It will take vast amount of time and money to put the road in the even poor condition that it was before the rain, and the officials will endeavor only to make it travelable.

In order for the road to be made secure, it will be necessary to build a new one, and to do this would require more than the remainder of the summer. As this will be too late to be of the best service, the thoroughfare will not be relocated or renovated until fall."

The News last Saturday carried the following as to repairs on the road:

"Information from Caesar's Head is that the Jones Gap road has been repaired and that once more this passage up the mountain is in good condition. The News' informant states that the road was not so badly injured by the heavy rains of last week as some first reports indicated. The road, it is stated, will be in better condition than at any other time, when the work now in progress is completed. Two gangs started working on the road immediately after the heavy rains, and soon had it in passable condition."

EDITORS GOT ROYAL RECEPTION AT SYLVA

HOLLOWELL AND JONES RE-ELECTED TO OFFICE

Western Carolina Scribes Held Quarterly Meeting; To Hendersonville Next.

The Western North Carolina Weekly Press association met in quarterly session in Sylva last week from Thursday until Saturday and had a big fuss made over them by the Jacksonians. They made a great to-do over their guests and showed them every hospitality in range of reason. The editors were taken by great surprise to find the Sylva people in such a receptive mood. The entertainment was indeed royal.

The editors were welcomed to the club rooms on Thursday night and C. C. Buchanan, the official town orator, and a man who is never wanting for nice flowery sentences and good thought, as was learned by his county school commencement address this spring in Brevard, delivered the address of welcome. Talks of various kinds were followed by refreshments.

Friday morning was spent in social pastime. On Friday afternoon the editors went into executive session, held the semi-annual election of officers, listened to official reports, addresses and shop talk.

Later in the afternoon a ball game between Sylva and Andrews was enjoyed. Following this the editors with a number of citizens made the seven-mile trip by automobile to the Gillohee Normal and Industrial School, where the 2000 lady school teachers Editor Dan Tomkins has been making march over, received the recorders of history with open arms (literally instead of literally) and the management of the institution served a feast of good things to eat. Mixed with this banquet was a speech by members of the institution faculty and the press association.

On Saturday morning the newspaper men were taken on an inspection tour through the plant of the Sylva Tanning company, now nearing completion, and the tannery, which has been in operation for a number of years but which was recently taken over by the Armour interests.

The members of the press departed for their homes shortly before noon Saturday, all feeling proud of the hospitality shown them by the people of Jackson county, from whom the scribes learned an important lesson in townly ally and looting.

One of the principal features of the association will be its visits of inspection, resulting in greater education as to the industries, resources and possibilities of this section. Each member of the association has agreed to write his impressions and something of the places visited, thereby giving the different towns industrial writings that circulate in the magazines in nearly every state of the United States.

The News will deal with the industrial, educational and statistical phases of Jackson county at an early date, possibly next week.

R. L. Sandidge of the Bryson City Times and R. B. Wilson of the Waynesville Courier were elected first and second vice presidents, respectively. Ora L. Jones of the Quality Print Shop was re-elected secretary.

Jesse Daniel Boone of the Waynesville Mountaineer was re-elected poet.

Dan Tomkins of the Jackson County Journal was re-elected orator.

W. F. Little of the Tryon News-Bee was re-elected treasurer.

Gordon E. Garlington of the Hendersonville Hustler, chairman; Horace Sontelle of the Canton Observer and J. B. Craigmales of the Mitchell County Banner were elected members of the executive committee.

Upon the invitation of Mr. Garlington, the newspaper men will hold their next meeting in Hendersonville on October 27, 28.

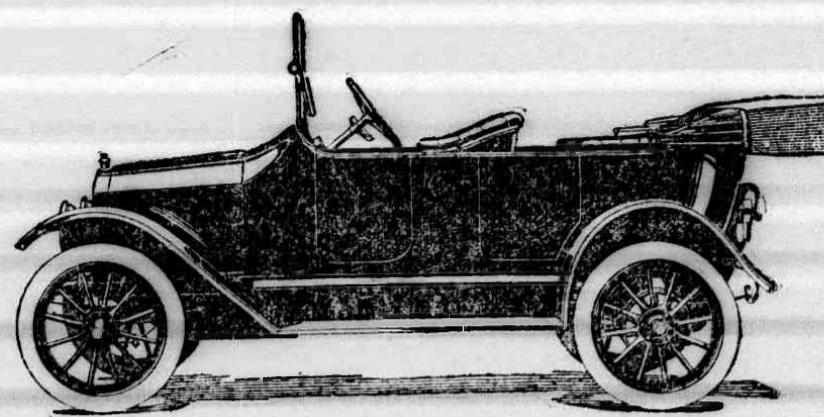
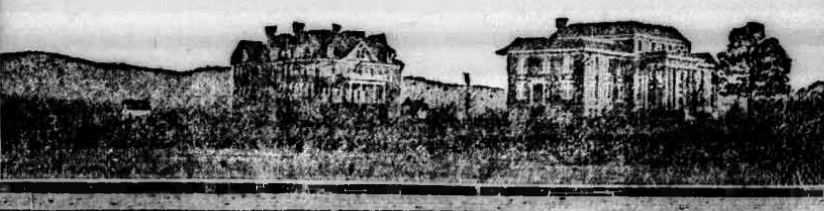

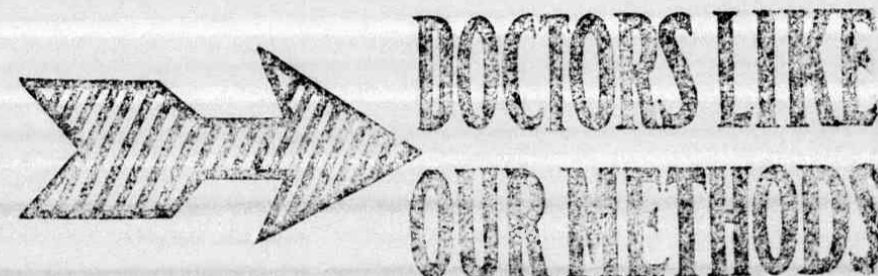
