EDITORIAL.

WE READILY COMPLY.

The "Carthage Blade" is a journal of an order about the special tax suit brought against the State by the A. H. Temple. It is an effort to keep the people from seeing you.

Our readers are not informed as to what the special tax bonds are, if they do, however, here it is. They are bonds issued by the carpet bag legislature of 1871, to build railroads, but squandered by Swepson & Co., and bought by Northern capitalists for a mere song. As the State of North Carolina received no benefit from them, she rightfully repudiated them.

The law of the State being so constructed that residents of another State could not sue it, these bondholders engaged with one A. H.
