A New Enterprise.

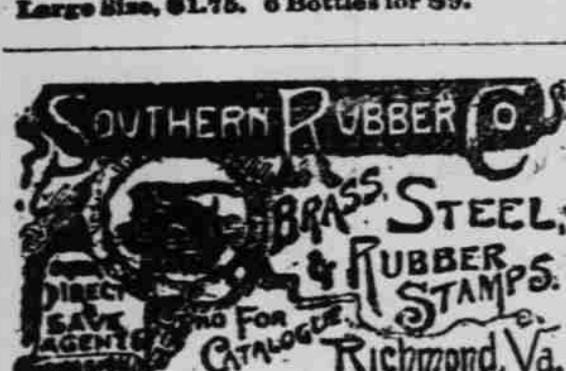
