There has been 8,107,691 bales of cotton brought to market since September 1st, which is nearly five hundred thousand bales more than at this date last year.

Much of this cotton doubtless was held over from the former season, but it sufficiently appears that the crop now being marketed is quite as large as the previous one. With a visible supply 1,200,000 bales greater than on this date last year, one plainly sees the reason why the market is so depressed.
