The political sky in Harnett is clear, and the outlook is all that could be expected. The Democratic county Convention to elect delegates to the State and Congressional Conventions was held on the 2nd instant.

Delegates were elected who will go to Raleigh on the 18th, and who will do everything in their power to uphold and assert the great principles of the Democratic party. Before the county convention convened, it was apprehended that a few men would be present who would work in the interest of the Third party, but this was not a well grounded apprehension, and resolutions were unanimously adopted condemning the Third party, and also endorsing the wise and conservative administration of Governor Holt. We think the Convention ought to be congratulated upon the harmony that prevailed and upon the resolutions adopted. As we have often had occasion to say North Carolina and the American union need no Third party.

As sure as the Third party ever develops any strength, the phoenix of the Democracy will be broken, the country will be turned over to the money power, and the only political party from which the laboring masses can expect relief will die.

We can never believe that the masses of the people, who are oppressed by a burdensome war tariff, and who have to pay the manufacturer a bonus of sixty per cent, since the passage of the McKinley bill up on articles of daily consumption, are going to lend their co-operation to a party of such a platform as that recently adopted at the St. Louis Convention. The Convention studiously avoided any condemnation of the Protective Tariff, which is the vital political issue before the country, and we can't help thinking that the Third party leaders are conspiring with the Republicans.

GRADY'S ADVICE.

Almost the last utterance of Henry Grady were words of warning to his fellow countryman, south and north. Looking forward to the attempted organization of a Third party in the south, he said:

"Many men hold that the white vote of the south should divide, the color line be beaten down, and the southern State ranged on economic or moral questions as interest of relief demands. I am compelled to dissent from this view. The worst thing in my opinion, that could happen is that the white people of the south stand in the opposing factions, with the vast mass of ignorant or purchasable negro votes between. Consider such a status."

"And it should be well to consider such a status, for we are confronted with political complication that may lead to it. However desirous our people may be to bring about a thorough reform of the financial system, imposed upon them by the Republican party, they should be careful to avoid doing anything to perpetuate this objectionable system. Questions, therefore, tending to divide the white voters of the State should be eliminated from political conventions, and such only presented as are more likely to harmonize opposing views.

But the advocates of a Third party and Third party principles oppose this fair standard for political guidance. They insist that their peculiar views shall be accepted, and their candidate nominated, or they will an independent party and thus do what Mr. Grady deprecated—divide the white voters of the South.

The white people of the State who have always affiliated politically with the Democratic party, and thereby rescued North Carolina from Republican domination and established a good government, are asked to surrender the cardinal doctrine of their political faith, or new and untried theories. They are not only asked, but it is demanded that political principles be sacrificed as if there was no honor or manhood in politics.

The St. Louis platform is not the platform of the Alliance, its leaning principles has been repudiated by every Alliance in North Carolina, and the record of the Alliance will show it, and why should the attempt be repeated with the view of committing political diplomacy, to the support of a Third party? Those who have convictions, and think it right and honorable to stand by their convictions will not violate their consciences to advance the political fortunes of office seekers, and will stand no trifling in the matter.—State Chronicle.
