THE GREATNESS OF LONDON.

Doubtless you are quite accustomed to the statement that London is a great city. But probably the following figures will help you to appreciate this statement:

Every four minutes marks a birth. In the next two hours after you have read this, thirty babies will have been born, and twenty deaths will have occurred. Think of it! The evening paper that records the births and deaths of the preceding day must give three hundred separate items. Verily its joys and sorrows are a multitude. London has 7,000 miles of streets and if you walked them at the rate of 20 miles a day you'd have to walk almost a year, and more than a year by nearly fifty days, if you should rest on Sundays and if you were a thirsty sort of traveler, and couldn't pass a public house, don't be alarmed. The seven thousand miles of streets have 75 miles of public houses, so you need not think of thirst. In a year London folks swallow down 500,000 oxen, 2,000,000 sheep, 200,000 calves, 200,000 swine, 8,000,000 head of fowls, 500,000,000 pounds of fish, 500,000,000 oysters, 200,000,000 lobsters, 75,000,000 bushels of wheat. But how they wash all the food down you might be proud to know. It takes 200,000,000 quarts of beer. But more than this, they drink 10,000,000 quarts of wine. Combine the wine, rum and beer consumed there in one year and we have a total of 260,000,000.—Exchange.

THE NEXT U. S. SENATE.

There are now 39 Democrats and 47 Republicans in the Senate; also two "Farmers' Alliance" men—Peffer, of Kansas and Lyle, of South Dakota.

The terms of 8 Democrats will expire on the 4th of March next—Bate, of Tennessee; Blodgett, of New Jersey; Mills of Texas; Cockrell, of Missouri; Faulkner, of West Va.; Gray, of Delaware; Pardo, of Florida and Turpie, of Indiana.

It is hardly probable that the Republicans can elect the successor to any one of these, except, possibly, Mr. Turpie.

The terms of 24 Republican Senators expire at the same time, all from Northern States. The Democrats have a good prospect of electing the successor of Davis, of Minnesota; Felton, of California; Hawley, of Connecticut; Hiseock, of N. Y.; Paddock, of Nebraska; Sanders, Missouri; Sawyer, of Wisconsin; Stewart,

A gain of 4 seats would make a tie between the Democrats and Republicans, and there is no good reason to doubt that 3 of these gains will be secured in New York, Michigan and Wisconsin. Another would be certain in Connecticut if the popular vote could elect a Senator.

There is no likelihood of the Democratic strength in the Senate being reduced by these elections, but a hopeful prospect that they will obtain a majority of the body.

Mr. Grady stood the average grading 63 out of five applicants. His alternate, Albert Oliver of Duplin, who made an average of 58 13 36.

July the 20th is the District Convention to nominate a Congressman, and also the same day Harnett, Bladen and Sampson select two Senators to represent them in the next Legislature. The convention meets in Clinton. We want good men. Who shall they be? We can find them in either county, but our delegates should begin to look out for the men they want, and decide which county is entitled to the men this time.
