On Thursday morning when the mail stopped at the depot Mr. W. C. Troy of Fayetteville with the Band and a cannon and Judge T. B. Womack of Chatham county got off. Hon. Octavius Coke arrived the evening before. The Democrats of Harnett and the surrounding counties had hoisted a flag on a 75 or 100 feet pole and some fifteen hundred people were rallying around it.
