Ben C. Parker of Fayetteville, killed Friday by E. J. Fuller.

Friday evening the sad news reached here of the death of Mr. B. C. Parker of Fayetteville, brother-in-law to our townsman Mr. W. T. Dupree and brother of Mr. E. L. Parker. Mr. Ben C. Parker was shot in an altercation with E. C. Fuller on the streets in Fayetteville on Friday the 11th at about 1 o'clock p. m. Mr. Fuller is a member of a good family of that city, and was a clerk in an Insurance office there. Mr. Parker was a young man of good business qualities and was in the clothing business in Fayetteville. He was a native of this county, having lived at Aversboro until several years ago he went to that town. He is highly connected in the county, and many friends and relatives who received the unexpected sad news with deep regret. The difference arose over a misunderstanding about some young ladies which both young men visited. The affray took place in front of Mrs. H. L. Cook's residence, by Mr. Parker was found a pair of knucks which is supposed to have been used in the fight. After Mr. Parker was shot, Fuller went to Kings Drug store and dressed his face, and then went and gave himself up to the sheriff and told the circumstances, and claims that he had to shoot in defence. The whole affair was an unexpected tragedy and much regretted by all good people. Messrs. W. T. Dupree, E. L. and F. A. Parker went down Friday night and brought the corpse here Saturday morning, but afterwards decided to let him be buried in Fayetteville, so his remains were taken back, and Sunday layed to rest in the Cemetery there. Mr. Parker was soon to have been married to a young lady in Fayetteville.

20th Weely Weather Crop Bulletin.

The reports of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin, issued by the North Carolina State Weather Service, for the week ending Monday, August 14th, 1893, show that generally favorable conditions have prevailed during the past week. The temperature has been somewhat below the normal. Several cool nights at the beginning and at the end of the week have been unfavorable, but the middle of the week was warmer, and abundant sunshine during the days has been beneficial. The rain-fall was also below the normal. Some showers occurred the first of the week and on Friday and Saturday. Cotton, though small and late, is fruiting remarkably well; the plants seem to be full of bolls, and there is very little shedding. The crop will better than anticipated. A good deal of seed has been sown and is germinating well; farmers are busy planting turnip seed now. Similar conditions have prevailed in all districts.
