With such men in that Assembly as the various States send there to represent their interests, it does seem that they would try to be governed by the petitions of their constituents, and not keep the whole country in suspense and all the Populists and news papers criticising such an August Body. Don't wait to get the bill to suit every man, for that can't be done. Don't wait to suit the President, for he is only one man, but vote for the good of the country, the great masses of the people, for the working class, and then your duty will have been performed, and if the bill is vetoed by the President it is only his fault. The Congress of these United States is casting a vast sum every day and if it can't at least, do something for the country, adjourn, and let its members go home. There, we see every day that scarcely a quorum can be found in the halls of either House. Well, those members are not doing their full work, or they would be at their post, trying to accomplish something. When the government pays men to work, they ought to work, and when they get so they won't do their duty, take them down and try their forces.

PATRIOTIC NEWS BUREAU.

The point in the present fight in the Senate is this: If the Sherman law is unconditionally repealed, for at least four years, there will not be a dollar added to our currency, but on the other hand there will be a contraction by shipments, abrasion, etc., for Mr. Cleveland will most certainly veto any bill to coin silver that Congress may hereafter pass while he is President. On the other hand, if the Sherman act remains, there will be an increase of nearly \$50,000,000 a year, and if any recognition of silver in any form is to be had, it must be contained in the same act that repeals

the Sherman act, for if presented in a separate bill, it will most surely be vetoed. Hence, an unconditional repeal of the Sherman act means the stoppage of all coinage of silver, a gradual contraction of the currency, slowly decreasing prices of all commodities and higher times. If there is a complete stoppage of coinage of silver in this country and India for four years there will be no market for silver bullion as the use in the mechanic arts, and the price will fall to 30 or 40 cents per ounce. That will close every silver mine in seven States and Territories. The inhabitants of those States cannot exist there for four years with the mines closed.

Before the four years are ended they will be mostly uninhabited deserts and one-third of the territory of the United States will return to its native wildness. Is there any wonder that every means known to human ingenuity will be resorted to to prevent such a catastrophe? Or that Senator Pugh, of Alabama should use language like the following:

"It is the determined and unalterable purpose of the opponents of repeal to stand on their convictions of public duty and fidelity to their pledges to the people whom they represent, and who have honored them with their confidence on this vital question, until physical strength is exhausted and the power of speech is left to no Senator to prevent the success of the conspiracy denounced by John G. Carlisle as equal in its consequence to war, pestilence, or famine."

Of course Senator Pugh has no interest in mines or silver bullion, but he knows that a further contraction of the volume of money means still lower prices for every product of the farmers and planters of his State and in the end general poverty, and he stands up to defend the hearths and homes of his constituents.

25TH WEEKLY WEATHER CROP BULLETIN.

The report of correspondents of the Weekly Weather Crop Bulletin issued by the North Carolina State Weather Service for the week ending Monday, September 19th, 1893, indicate that the first part of the week was very unfavorable on account of much rain, cloudy weather and lack of sunshine. After Thursday the weather was good, except some cool nights during last few days. Special reports concerning cotton indicate a very unfavorable outlook. The probable yield cannot be estimated over seventy-five per cent, and will be probably considerably under that figure. Out of over a hundred reports, only five make cotton in a good condition, with prospects of average yield. Picking cotton became general latter part of the week. The wet weather has also caused second growth on tobacco and some poor cures. Owing to soft condition of soil farm work has been interrupted. Fine weather the coming week will brighten prospects materially.

EASTERN DISTRICT.—Excessive rains during first three days of the week injured cotton considerably, and a great many acres of corn in lowlands along the Roanoke river, it is thought, will be ruined by the freshet. Cotton-picking was of course retarded. Majority of reporters say that cotton is well balled, though the stalk is small, and some few estimate an average yield. The full effect of the recent rains is not apparent yet, however. There is considerable rust and shedding of leaves and some rotting of bolls. Turnips doing well. Peanuts and rice promises good yields. Rains reported: Embro, 5.86 inches; Floral College, 2.00; Lewiston, 3.40; Weldon, 3.53; Wilmington, 1.47; Grouton, 3.30; Newbern, 2.37; Goldsboro, 2.50; Lumberton, 2.75.

CENTRAL DISTRICT.—The weather was very cloudy and rainy until

Thursday; the last of the week was bright and more favorable. Friday was very warm, but a cool wave spread over the State on Sunday. The wet weather of the first of the week has been very damaging to all crops, besides causing heavy floods in many of the streams. The damp weather has caused second growth of tobacco, and interfered with curing. Special reports concerning the condition of cotton indicate a rather gloomy outlook. Rotting and sprouting in bolls continues; much of it is lying on the ground from effects of storms. Some correspondents report that August squares have been shed. Cotton not opening so fast, and picking is not general yet. The probable yield in this district cannot be placed above seventy per cent. Rains reported: Osborne, 2.38 inches; Lillington, 2.39; Monroe, 0.70; Lumburg, 5.80; Smithfield, 1.30; Raleigh, 0.75; Greensboro, 2.88; Chapel Hill (on 13th) 2.70.
