EVERY TOWN SHOULD HAVE ONE OF ITS OWN.

The Stanly News says that "Albemarle has thrice been swindled by building and loan association agents," and it comes to that conclusion that they are all "a set of liars and scoundrels." The legitimate building and loan association is one of the most beneficent institutions that the wis-

dom of man has ever devised, blessing everybody connected with it, whether as borrower or investor. If it were not so the country would not be filled with fakirs sounding the praises of fake associations and promising all sorts of impossible things. The people of any community the size of Albemarle or larger can organize an association that can build and loan association and they should not think (as they probably will not again, having been swindled thrice) of going into any outside concern. One of these associations can loan money at 8 per cent, and none of them can afford, if doing a legitimate business, to loan it for less. At this loaning rate it can make 8 per cent, for the non-borrower and may make 10, but it is not likely to go above 9. If it professes to go above 10 it is either lying, or swindling those who borrow from it. But without going into the details, the fact we want to impress for the benefit of Albemarle and all other places that are without local building and loan associations is that they can manage them as well as the places that have them do, and that no outside association can take their money and do as well with it for them as they can for themselves.—Charlotte Observer.

We have repeatedly suggested and urged the same point in our town in regard to Building and Loan Associations. Our town has had the same experience with them that Stanly has. Now we would advise those who wish to realize a good investment to organize a Board here, and start on home, our people can manage the money at home as well, and better than to send it away, then we keep in circulation all the invested capital among us, and all the commissions and fees will be handled by home folks, it would help the borrower and give the lender a good interest and safe investment. There is no reason why the business men of our town could not make a success of an Association. So we would throw out these remarks, that the people can think of the matter and if they seem inclined to do so, they might call a meeting and get the sentiment of the citizens and if they see fit, then organize. Thursday; the last of the week was bright and more favorable. Friday was very warm, but a cool wave spread over the State on Sunday. The wet weather of the first of the week has been very damaging to all crops, besides causing heavy floods in many of the streams. The damp weather has caused second growth of tobacco, and interfered with curing. Special reports concerning the condition of cotton indicate a rather gloomy outlook. Rotting and sprouting in bolls continues; much of it is lying on the ground from effects of storms. Some correspondents report that August squares have been shed. Cotton not opening so fast, and picking is not general yet. The probable yield in this district cannot be placed above seventy per cent. Rains reported: Osborne, 2.38 inches; Lillington, 2.30; Monroe, 0.70; Lahrnburg, 5.80; Smithfield, 1.30; Raleigh, 0.75; Greensboro, 2.88; Chapel Hill (on 13th) 2.70.

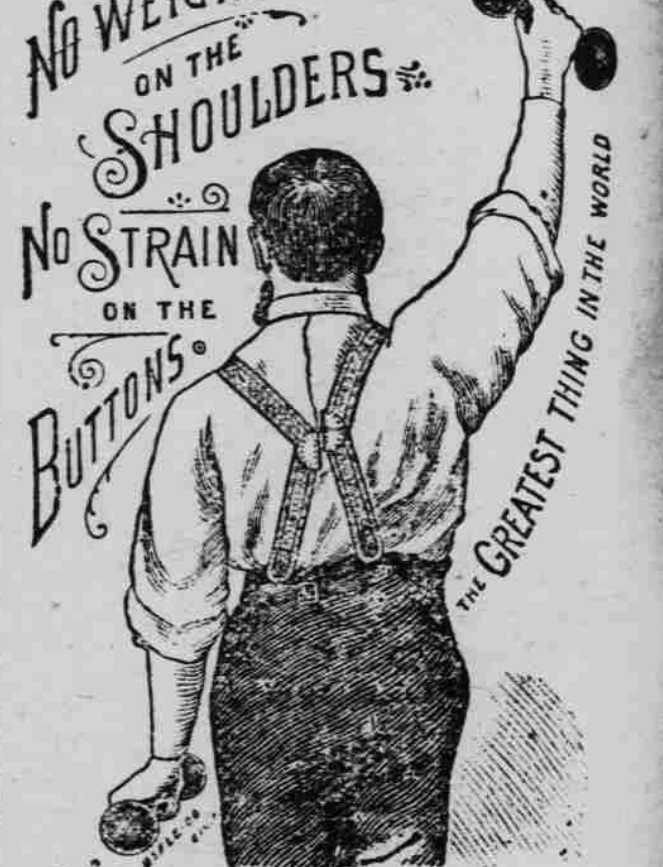
