Marion Butler now has the consolation to know he stamped Virginia with his wide two and one half hour approach, but the echo comes ringing back down the hills of old North Carolina that she went democratic by 40,000.

The North and West may go republican, but when the news of the election came in from this side of the Mason and Dixon line, yea she remains still the solid South. Our Southern people know who gave them a good State and county government.

Marion Butler, the Progressive Farmer and the Sub-Alliance Politician, can give the democrats a rest now for a few days, and accuse the republicans of election frauds and all such stuff, because the democrats only cheated them out of Virginia Kentucky and Maryland this time.

Of the thirteen State elections on the first Tuesday in this month, 19 of them went republican, 3 democratic and one Populist. Nevada is the only State, so far, that the Populists can claim, even Kansas, the home of Mrs. Lease, the champion Third Party champion has fallen in the republican current. But this is just illustrating what we have always said, that the thirdites would turn the government over to the republicans, if they could not get anything themselves. Ruin or ruin seems to be their motto.

The Independent Company of Fayetteville, seem very much hurt at being dropped from the State Guard, without any notification, and it does seem trying to them. It is the oldest Company in the Union, always responded to every call and did fine service in the war of 1812, and in the war between the States. Now at the close of its hundredth anniversary, to be excluded from the State Guard, because they prefer not to wear blue uniforms, is rather piercing. They claim the right to wear blue by a special act of the legislature, and so think they had a just claim to be kept in the Guard. The Observer comes out in a supplement with all the correspondence, which vindicates the F. I. L. I. Co's cause thoroughly. We give the following extracts from the Observer of Oct. 26th, which will give an idea of the trouble and how it came about.

Because of the history of this "Ancient and honorable" corps—which begins almost at the beginning of the history of North Carolina as a State in the American Union—the people of North Carolina will, as we have suggested, find matter of the deepest interest to them in reading every word of the report which gives the details of the first assault that has ever been made upon its honor as a military organization; and for the same reason they will rejoice with us, we doubt not, in the complete explanation which the documentary evidence now published secures for

It may be useful, however, to say a few words on the matter now in question. From the fact that, after the war, the Company adopted the grey uniform, which most of its members had served the Confederacy, for its uniform; that in 1878 it voluntarily became a part of the State Guard, and a new feature in our mi-

litia system borrowed from the worthy example of some of the Northern States, and then just organized; that in 1890 an order was issued prescribing blue uniforms for all companies in the Guard, that the Company appealed to the Governor (Fowle) through the proper channels, to be allowed to retain its grey uniform as one of its privileges under its charter; that, upon Governor Fowle's suggestion, it withdrew from the Guard; that, last year, at the request of the Adjutant General (Glenn), as approved by the Governor (Holt), it re-entered the Guard as an "unattached company," upon the proffered stipulation that it should retain and wear its grey uniform; and that, without warning—certainly without due warning, so far as appears it was "dropped" from the Guard for reasons afterwards described by the Governor as "defying the law and regulations," &c., as recited above.
