Highway Robbery.

Staly County's Gold.

Only about a month ago gold was discovered on W. S. Ingram's land, and at once Mr. Ingram allowed parties to commence prospecting for the same. As a result in about ten days the entire neighborhood became greatly excited. As many as fifty men began search at once, and an extraordinary rich find has been the result. Last Saturday a nugget weighing 63 dwt. was found and a great many others ranging from 1/2 to 30 dwt., and the old farm of about 200 acres that could have been bought for \$1,500 has suddenly been increased in value to an extent unknown. Some say \$5,000 has been offered for it and others say \$12,000. As to the manner of working the mine, the old-fashioned rocker is used, but often the gold is clearly detected without the use of the rocker. Mr. Ingram does not want the mine developed any farther. It bids fair to rival the Tobe Saunders mine.—Staly News.

The Vice President's Son to Marry.

Louis Green Stevenson, only son of the Vice President of the United States, is to be married on November 21st to Miss Helen L. Davis. The two young people have been devoted to each other for years, and it is no surprise, therefore, that they are soon to be married.

Miss Davis is twenty years of age. She was graduated from the State Normal School in this city, afterward attended a school at Boston and completed her education in Europe. Immediately after the wedding which is to take place at the residence of the bride's parents, the couple will go to Europe for a short stay, and after their return will live in Washington,

young Mr. Stevenson being his father's secretary.

One curious feature of this contemplated union is that the bride's father is the editor of one of the most radical Republican newspapers in Central Illinois, while her grandfather, the late Jesse W. THE WORLD'S FAIR BUILDINGS.

It cost \$30,000,000 to make the Fair. The officials would like to know just how much it will cost to unmake it. The Fair officials are under a bond of \$100,000 to have all the buildings and other appurtenances of the Fair removed and the park returned to its former condition by Jan. 1, 1894. To do this is now practically impossible, and they have asked the Park Commissioners for at least six months' extension, of the time, and, if possible twelve months. This request will be granted probably, but there are other difficulties. The Fair people do not know where to find purchasers for the buildings. There are about one hundred in the park exclusive of small refreshment pavilions, and there is enough material in them if it were the right sort to build a considerable town. In this the trouble lies. Nobody wants the material, and to have the buildings torn down and the debris, carried away would make such a hole in the receipts from the recent large crowds that very few dollars would be left for the stockholders.

At the opening of the Fair the buildings were included in the list of probable assets at its close, and many thought that at least \$1,000,000 would be realized from their sale. Now the directors would be glad to give them in a lump to the man who would take them all away and restore the ground.

Whatever may be the fate of the other features of the World's Fair, the Ferris Wheel will not be moved to Coney Island or elsewhere. It will remain in Midway Plaisance. The Company has the right to its present position on Midway until May 1, 1894, and there it will remain. Before the expiration of that time arrangements will probably be made for a contract between the Park Commissioners and the Company for the right to the position. Men who have money invested in the wheel are satisfied with the present situation and believe that even after the Fair has closed it will be sufficiently well patronized to pay for its operation.—North Carolinian.

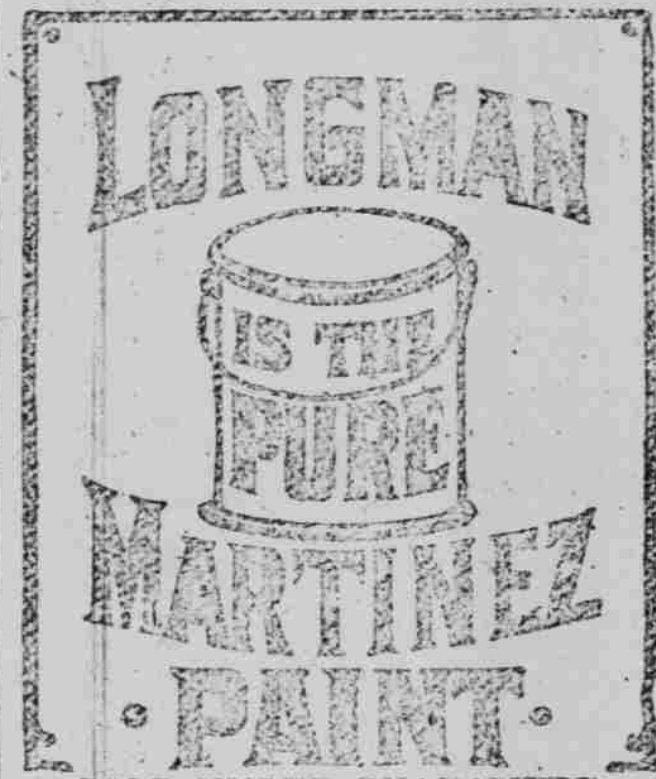

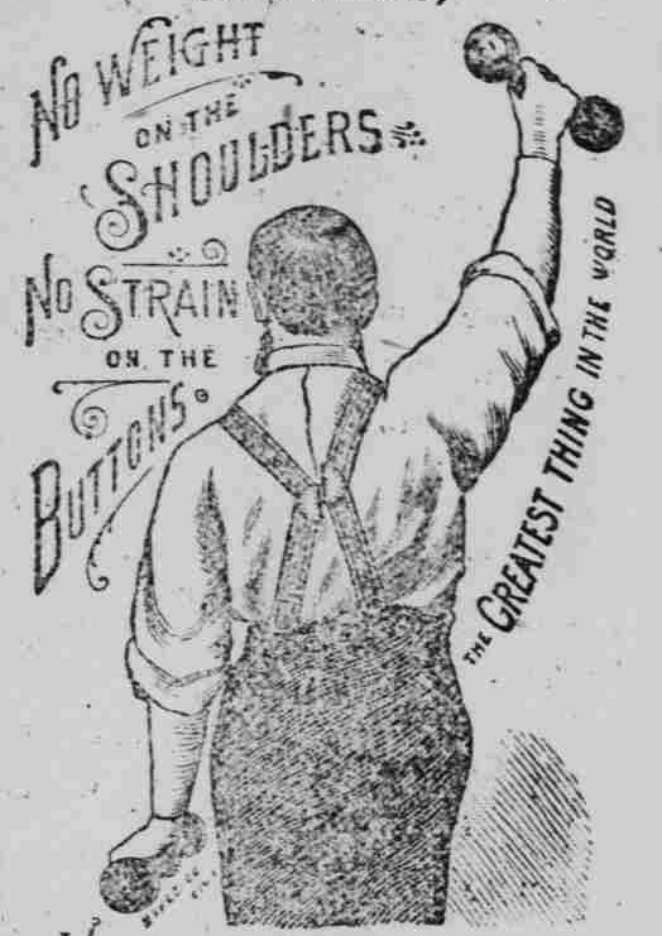
