As stated in last weeks issue we will make known to the public our Demands Viz: DEMANDS OF THE OWL CLUB.

I. That every voter of the United States be paid an annual pension of Twelve Hundred Dollars and that every other person in these United States be paid an annual pension of six hundred dollars, and that to pay these pensions Congress shall print and issue "legal tender paper greenback promises to pay" in amounts sufficient to pay the same pensions and the expense of printing and issuing these notes shall be paid with the same notes.

II. That these notes shall be legal tender for all debts public private or personal. Good debt, bad debts, bad and indifferent debts, and that all mortgages shall and must be paid with these notes.

III. That the public officials of this national government be paid one fourth of what they now receive and shall be paid in these notes, and that the members of the Owl Club shall be paid an annual pension of twenty thousand dollars in gold, and that this be the only gold coin that shall be allowed to circulate.

IV. That every qualified voter shall vote the Democratic ticket unless he prefers to vote some other ticket.

V. That the expenses of every political campaign be paid by national funds.

And that no man shall be allowed to sell his vote for less than fifty cents or two drinks.

VI. That no man shall be allowed to object to these demands unless his can write a better set than these, and is a free holder and paid his state and county taxes for 1893, or been a road overseer magistrate township constable, or a candidate for some office.
