Dr. John McCormick Dead.

Dr. John McCormick, after many years of usefulness to his country, passed away at his home near Swans' Station the 7th.

Dr. McCormick was a man of noble mind and thought, and was looked upon by the citizens of this county as one of their ablest citizens, and was beloved by all who knew him. He represented Cumberland and Harnett in the Senate and also Harnett in the Legislature, and was a director in the North Carolina Insane Asylum.

The immediate cause of his death was heart-failure. He had been complaining for several days, and the morning he died he arose as usual, but about 8 o'clock he was taken and passed away in a few minutes.

Thus ended a life of noble deeds, and one who loved his God, his country and his neighbors.

The Populist are losing every day their men of character, and all those who went into it from principle see that they must now leave the party or prove untrue to their principles.

These men see the base purposes for which they are being used by the Populist leaders; they are spurning that leadership and coming back to the Democratic party. Let us well-back home all these, who, in leaving us, acted from pure motives and from pure motives and from conscientious principles. Their return increases our majority, and adds gladness to our success. The best men in the Republican party, disgusted with such performance as have lately been seen in this State, refuse to sanction the deals made by their own discredited leaders with would-be Populist autocrats, and announce that they will assist in burying the Fusion ticket.

In almost every county in the State discord reigns supreme among the ranks of our enemy. Disgust and in ignation fill the minds of honest men of both Republican and Populist parties; they spurn the loathsome dish offered them by the fusionists. They feel that their per-

sonal honor and personal dignity require them to adopt this course and they no longer hesitate to proclaim their intention.

The question now is only one of majority. What shall majority be?
