The leading feature of the session of the Senate was a long debate upon a resolution of Mr. Abell, that the Committee on Public Printing be instructed to let out the public printing to the lowest responsible bidder.

The resolution was opposed by Mr. Cook and others, and Mr. Starbuck, of Guilford, offered a substitute, which was in effect the same as Mr. Abell's resolution, authorizing the Printing Committee to prepare and report at once a bill letting the printing to the lowest possible bidder, Mr. Starbuck's substitute was adopted by unanimous vote,

During the discussion it was apparent that some of the Populists and Republicans were against letting the printing to the lowest bidder and wanted some favorite of thefrs to have it with a bonus attached.
