FUSION EXTRAVAGANCE.

The Legislature cost some \$65,000 more than the previous Legislature; its appropriations were over \$125,000 in excess of those of 1893-'94. As if not satisfied with these extravagances the public printing was given out as a job to party leeches, at an exorbitant price.

The Fusionists had delighted to charge the Democrats with extravagance in the matter of public printing because they elected a public printer instead of giving it out to the lowest responsible bidder. They declared that if elected they would reform this alleged abuse.

What did they do? In the first place they did not give the printing to the lowest bidder, but they awarded it to Stewart Brothers, of Winston for political reasons. And what is the result? Two bills have just been put in and paid, and a comparison with the one for the same work under Democratic rule is interesting.

The bill for printing the Widows' and Soldiers' pension list under Democratic rule was \$47,394. Stewart Brothers' bill for the same work is \$1,357,26, or an increase of \$1,309,87. The bill for printing the railroad assessment books under Democratic rule was \$35. The present public printers have been paid \$1,292 for the same work, or an increase of \$1,257.

And this is Fusion economy with a vengeance.

THE SINGLE STANDARD SIDE.

Here is the creed of Secretary Carlisle's arguments, in support of the financial policy of the administration.

1. There is not a free coinage country in the world to-day that is not on a silver basis.
2. There is not a gold standard country in the world to-day that does not use silver money along with gold.
3. There is not a silver standard country in the world to-day that uses any gold along with silver.
4. There is not a silver standard country in the world to-day that has more than one third of the circulation her capita that the United States has.
5. There is not a silver country in the world to-day where the laboring man receives fair pay for his day's work.

STEWART BROTHERS are the great economical printers, put in power by that great reform party, the Populist. They have already proven themselves extravagant and they will no doubt cost the State much more than was expected. For example: Two jobbers that have recently been turned out cost the State \$576.61 more than the same work did under Democratic rule. Our State will have to levy a special tax to pay for the printing.

All newspapers are filled daily with political matter, and every trace of faithfulness has gone to work in earnest to give the fusion party a black eye in 1896.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 15th, 1895.

The President will go to Gray Gables today.

President Cleveland has signed an order prepared by the Civil Service Commission, whereby about 2,500 positions in the Government Printing Office are put within the classified civil service. This will bring the total number of positions coming under the civil service in this country to approximately 55,000.

Vivian Brent of Md. has been appointed first assistant attorney in the Interior Department at \$2,750 a year, in place of Emory C. Best, who was yesterday appointed assistant commissioner of the general land office.

Robt. W. Hunter of Va. has been appointed assistant attorney at \$2,500 a year, in Mr. Brent's place. Both appointments are in the line of promotion for skill and efficiency.

Assistant Secretary McAduff leaves to-day for N. C.

The Post of this morning says:

Mr. Henry Macy, of Henderson was best man. The ushers were Drs. L. L. Harban and Stewart Muncaster and Julian Miller of Alex.; Mr. Joseph Stinesmetz, of Phila.; Mr. J. H. Bridger, of Henderson and Mr. Guy Wall. The groom is one of the most prominent dealers in tobacco in the South. The couple will reside at Henderson. He is a near kinsman of President Zachary Taylor.

Ten boards to examine applicants for places in the internal revenue service have been appointed by the Civil Service.

Secretary Carlisle has gone to Louisville, Ky. where he delivered an address on the financial issues of the day.

I hear the "sound money" wing of the party is gaining ground throughout the country.

Capit. John B. Husey, private Secretary of Senator Marion Butler is probably responsible for the following which appears in the Post of this morning: "One of the youngest members of Congress whose future career is likely to prove of general interest is Representative Thomas Settle of N. C. In all probability Settle will be a prominent factor in the race for Governor of N. C., and there are plenty of Republicans who believe that if nominated he will be elected. In the light of his political success of the past this prediction appears to have considerable force behind it. Much of his prestige is derived from the general esteem in which his father, Judge Thomas Settle, is held by members of both parties in the State.

One of Harriet's leading Populist said, a few days ago, that if the Populists and Republicans fused in 1896, they would no doubt, elect a full ticket. We hope and expect the Populist party, after the next election, will sleep that blessed sleep from which none ever wake to weep. Asleep in shame, asleep in disgrace, then O Populist will ever rest.
