These poles are said to be staunch and reliable possessing a toughness which gives them exceptional weatherresisting power and durability over along period. Such pole ought to be extremly welcome in Oregon, where they have a busy woodpecker which makes its larder in the telegraph poles. Like the ant of La Fontaine, it lays in a stock of acorns for the winter, and chooses for its storehouses, by preference the tops of cedar telegraph poles.
