Harnett County Court-House and Funding Bond.

Know all men by these presents, that the County of Harnett of the State of North Carolina, for value received hereby acknowledges itself to be indebted and promises to pay to the bearer the sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS on the first day of January, in the year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventeen, in lawful money of the United States of America, at the National Bank of the Republic of New-York City, with interest thereon from the date hereof, at the rate of SIX PER CENTUM per annum, payable annually in like money on the first day of January of each year at the National Bank of the Republic of New York City on the presentation and surrender of the annexed coupons as they severally become due. This bond is one of a series of forty-eight bonds of like date, tenor and amount, numbered from one to forty-eight, both inclusive, and said bonds are issued by authority conferred and pursuant to the provisions of an act of the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, entitled, "An Act to authorize the Board of Commissioners of Harnett County to issue bonds and to levy a special tax for the special purpose of funding and paying the existing debt of said County, and for other special purposes," ratified February 15th, 1897, as well as pursuant to resolutions of the Board of Commissioners of Harnett County, adopted at their regular meeting on the first Monday of June 1897, and resolutions adopted at a special meeting duly held on July 5th, 1897, of which those numbered from one to twelve inclusive, are issued for the purpose of building a Court House and the others for funding and paying the existing debts of said County contracted for necessary expenses.

And pursuant to the authority conferred by said act it is hereby covenanted and agreed that the coupons hereto annexed will be received at their face value in payment of all county taxes or other County dues. And it is hereby further certified that pursuant to the provisions of the said Act the Board of Commissioners of said County ordered a special tax upon all the taxable property and persons of said County, sufficient to pay the interest on the bond as it accrues and to provide a sinking fund for the payment of the principal hereof at maturity, to be annually levied and collected and exclusively applied to such purpose. And it is hereby certified, that no provisions of the Constitution or laws of the State of North Carolina is in any way violated by the issue of said bonds, and it is further certified and declared that this series of bonds is issued only for the necessary expenses of the County namely Six Thousand Dollars for the building of a new County Court House, and the balance for the purpose of funding certain outstanding obligations of the County contracted by the County for necessary expenses. And it is further certified and declared that all acts and requirements and conditions precedent or otherwise to the issue of the said bonds have been duly and fully complied with, that the said bonds are in all respects legal, and that the public faith and credit of the said County of Harnett is hereby pledged for the payment and redemption of the same, and all interest coupons thereon, as the same respectively fall due. This bond is redeemable at the option of the County at any time after January first, Nineteen Hundred and Two, but the series of which this bond is one, shall only be redeemed in their numerical order commencing with number one.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the said Board of County Commissioners of Harnett County, North Carolina, has caused these presents to be signed by the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, and countersigned by the Clerk of said board, with the corporate seal of the county affixed as of the first day of January 1897.

The above is a copy of the bonds issued by the Board of County Commissioners for funding the county debt and to build a court house. There are forty-eight of them, amounting to \$24,000. They are neatly printed on parchment and are nicely executed. With each bond are twenty interest coupons, each for \$30, payable, the first one on January 1st 1898, one each year on January 1st for twenty years. The coupons read as follows:

\$30 The County of Harnett, of North Carolina, will pay to bearer, Thirty Dollars at the National Bank of the Republic of New York City, on the 1st day of January . . . . . being one years interest due on said date on Bond No. . . . . upon surrender of this coupon.

**THANKSGIVING DAY.**  
NOVEMBER 25 THE DATE SET BY THE PRESIDENT.

Washington, Oct. 30.—President McKinley yesterday issued his first Thanksgiving day proclamation as follows:  
"In remembrance of God's goodness to us during the past year, which has been so abundant, let us offer unto Him our thanksgiving and pay our vows unto the Most High." Under His watchful providence industry has prospered, the conditions of labor have been improved, the rewards of the husbandman have been increased and the comforts of our homes multiplied. His mighty hand has preserved peace and protected the nation. Respect for law and order has been strengthened, love of free institution cherished and all sections of our beloved country brought into closer bonds of fraternal regard and generous co-operation.

"For these great benefits it is our duty to praise the Lord in a spirit of humility and gratitude and to offer up to Him our most earnest supplications. That we may acknowledge our obligation as a people to Him who has so graciously granted us the blessings of free government and material prosperity, I, William McKinley, President of the United States, do hereby designate and set apart Thursday, the 25th day of November, for national thanksgiving and prayer, which all of the people are invited to observe with appropriate religious services in their respective places of worship. On this day of rejoicing and domestic reunion let our prayers ascend to the Giver of every good and perfect gift for the countenance of His love and favor to us, that our hearts may be filled with charity and good will, and that we may be ever worthy of His beneficent concern.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.  
"Done at the city of Washington, this 29th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-second."
