STATE NEWS.

ITEMS OF NEWS GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF THE STATE.

President Andrews, of Brown University, will deliver the literary address at the commencement at Chapel Hill next June.

A colored man jumped off a train in motion at Clarkton Monday of last week and was killed.

The Alliance Shoe Factory at Hillsboro has commenced operation and is turning out fifty pairs of women shoes a day.

A colored woman in the penitentiary at Raleigh gave birth to a child Saturday. She had only been in prison a few months.

A two-year-old child of Mr. Vernon Trull, of Union county, recently got a grain of corn in its windpipe and died from the effects produced.

The post office at Shotwell, Wake county, was robbed during Christmas week by thieves who got two registered letters and \$30 in money belonging to the postmaster.

A Mr. Risley has purchased 3,000 acres of land in Rowan county and is contracting for 7,000 more. He will bring a colony of Pennsylvanians to settle on it.

J. M. Mewborne, formerly Commissioner of Agriculture, was sworn in and took charge of the State penitentiary as Superintendent Saturday. John R. Smith whom he succeeds takes his place as Commissioner of Agriculture.

The first child ever born in the Governor's Mansion at Raleigh is Daniel Russell Sawyer, whose mother is Mrs. E. W. Sawyer, a niece of Mrs. Russell. The youngster made his appearance Saturday and tipped the beam at ten pounds.

John W. Harrison shot and killed Paul Stockton at Winston on December 29th. Harrison gave himself up to the sheriff claiming that he did the shooting in self defense and was bound over to court in the sum of \$5000. Both parties are of good families.

Alex Gilmore, the Cumberland county outlaw, plead guilty of burglary in the second degree at the criminal court in Cumberland last week and was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary. Gilmore is wanted in South Carolina where he is to serve 16 years of a 17 year sentence in the penitentiary of that State.

A special to the News and Observer of December 29th from Lumberton says: "Milby Willis, an old soldier, aged 84 years, walked to Lumberton Friday, a distance of about 12 miles, to get his pension. He received his money and started home. He had only gotten a short distance before he fell on the street and died in a few minutes. He was kindly wrapped in blanket used by S. C. Carlyle in the war, and his body carried to his family.
