LOCAL DOTS.

Splendid rains and the crops are growing just as fast as they can.

Only a few more days now until the county convention. There seems to be almost a dearth of candidates.

The summer of 1898 will go down in history among our people as "that hot summer." It has been unusually warm for several weeks now.

August cotton sold in New York last week for 5.95, reported to be the lowest price in fifty years. The crop that is raising now will probably be sold for 5 or 5 1/2 cents.

Some of the sidewalks in town are hard to find. They are grown up in weeds and one cannot travel them after a rain without getting the feet wet.

Mr. W. D. Thornton has finished his new blacksmith shop and moved in. He manufactures a splendid buggy and our readers may watch out for his "ad" in the near future.

A train loaded with soldiers passed here Sunday morning going South. We could not learn what troops they were or whether they were bound. Uncle Sam gives out little news now about his boys.

Don't forget to talk the "White Supremacy Club" idea among your neighbors! and get them to join you in establishing them. Every lady in the county is invited to become members of these clubs. The white men of North Carolina must rule North Carolina.

A young white man named Thomas A. Fowler who lives a few miles from Dunn, was arrested yesterday morning by deputy sheriff B. F. Smith upon a warrant charging him with an assault with a pistol. He was brought here for trial and the case was continued at his request until Friday.

John Sills, a sort of half idiotic white man who lives over in Cumberland, was taken to jail at Fayetteville Saturday afternoon by Constable J. C. Pope. Sills had whipped his wife so badly that she left him and went to her father's to live. He went after her and made threats and attempted to assault her with his knife.

Through some of our subscribers at Turlington, we learn that our papers did not reach that postoffice last week. On investigation we found that the papers were sent out from here but were not taken out at Turlington and came back to Dunn. We hope this will not happen again.

A crazy negro in Fayetteville, Monday morning created considerable excitement and did near a thousand dollars worth of damage before he could be stopped. He secured a hatchet and went down the main business street demolishing all the glass fronts as he went. The large glass front in the Frank Thornton building was a complete wreck. The negro was stopped at the Huske Hardware House when a white man knocked him down with a spade.

We hear the name of F. P. Jones, Esq., of our town spoken of for the nominee of the Democrats for Senator from this district. Harnett is entitled to name the Senator this year and we would be pleased to see Mr. Jones get the nomination. He is a strong man, is widely and favorably known in the district, and would make an excellent campaign.

The white men of Averasboro township in precinct No. 2, are requested to meet Messrs. John Lucas, H. V. Moulton, R. L. Godwin and D. H. Wilborn, committeemen, at Spring Hill School House next Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock for the purpose of organizing a White Supremacy Club. Every man who favors white supremacy and will vote for it is invited to attend. A special invitation is given to the ladies.

We understand that Capt. J. L. Autry, of Sampson is being spoken of as the probable nominee of the Democratic party from Sampson for the Senate. We do not know Capt. Autry only by reputation, but those who do know him say he is probably the strongest man the Democratic party could put up. He is a well-to-do farmer, and a man of much experience, a deep thinker, and a Democrat of the old type.

Teacher's Institute.

The County Institute for Harnett County white teachers is in session at Lillington this week and much interest is being manifested in the work. Prof. J. Y. Joyner, of the Greensboro Normal and Industrial College for girls, is conducting the Institute. There are between forty five and fifty teachers in attendance—nearly every teacher in the county. Prof. Campbell says it is by far the largest attendance and the best Institute ever held in the county. Prof. Joyner is very much pleased with the enthusiasm and interest in educational work of the teachers present. The average age of the teachers in attendance is 25 years, and the average experience in teaching is 5 1/2 years. This shows that our teachers are of considerable experience and much better prepared to give instruction than formerly.

Everybody in the county interested in education is cordially invited to attend the session of the Institute Friday. Prof. Joyner will then deliver an address to the public. There will be other addresses also and recitations and declamations by the teachers, interspersed with music. A large crowd is expected.

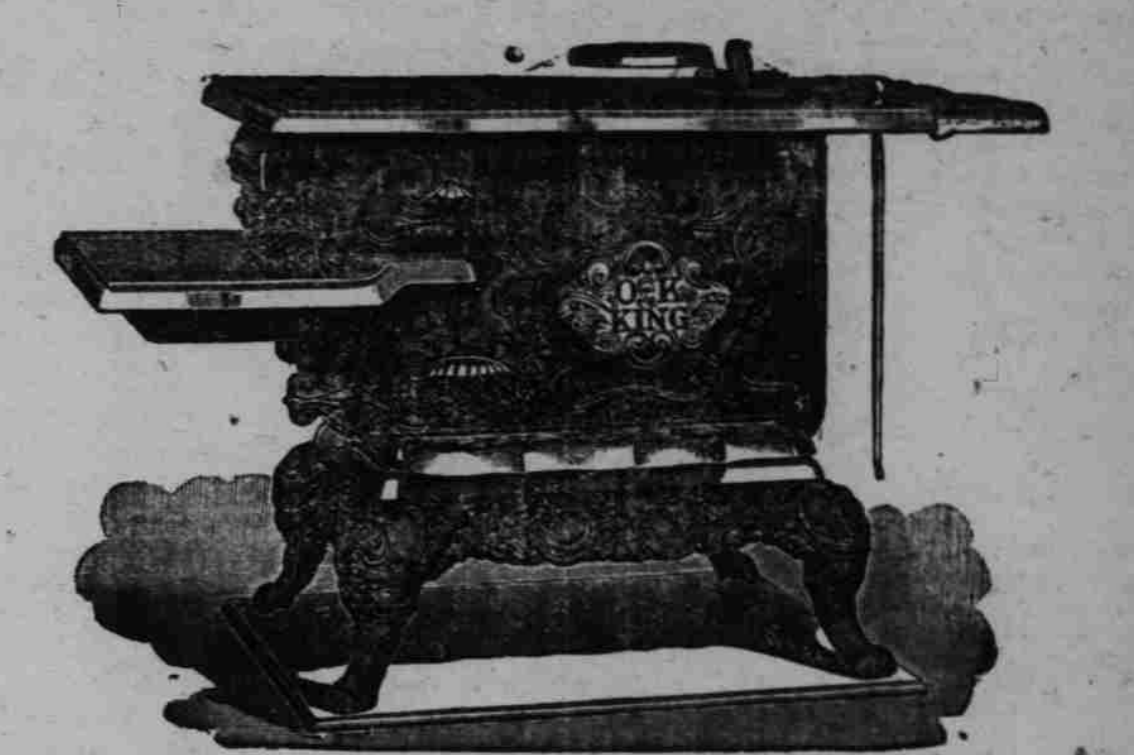

In Memory of W. A. Core.

William Adolphus Core was born November 21st, 1870, died July 21, 1898, aged 27 years and eight months.

The deceased came to Dunn from his home in Sampson county some thirteen months ago and lived with the writer, being employed by the South Dunn Manufacturing Company. For several days he had been complaining and left on Monday, July 4th, for his father's home in Sampson county to recuperate, but was taken that night with typhoid fever from which death resulted. He lay for days with a scorching fever which refused to yield to medicine and careful nursing until 3 o'clock on July 21st when the death angel appeared and took the life unto God who gave it. The efforts of his physician and his brothers and sisters could not stay the hand of the Reaper.

His remains were buried in the graveyard at home, where he had told his brother-in-law, Mr. R. M. Crumpler, when in good health, that he desired to be buried when he had finished this life.

We desire to express heartfelt gratitude to the many friends who were so kind and attentive to him in his illness and gave us much help and comfort in nursing him. May God help us all to walk uprightly and deal honest as he did, and make many friends and no enemies. He was prepared to enter college in 1897 but never did. He leaves a father, four brothers and five sisters to mourn their loss.
