Official Senatorial Vote.

The vote for State Senator in this district (14th) was canvassed by the sheriffs of the three counties, Harnett, Bladen and Sampson, at Roseboro last Saturday.

Candidates: J. W. S. ROBINSON, Democrat. Harnett.....1630 Bladen.....1692 Sampson.....1795

Thus it will be seen that Robinson received three more votes than White, his opponent. White received 24 votes more than Jones and 13 votes more than Gardner.

We understand that from irregularities in Sampson county Mr. Jones has given notice of a contest for the seat given Mr. White.

It is reported that quite a number of tickets with Mr. Jones' name on them were voted in that county and were not counted by the election boards, they declaring them illegal ballots.

Mr. Jones was by far the best equipped of the four candidates and it was largely through his efforts that a majority of 1700 votes against the Democratic party in this district two years ago was turned to a majority for the Democrats this year.

He did admirable work and made a strong and forcible canvass, and while he is defeated by the official count he won a great victory and ere the State Senate shall have been in session many days, he will receive the seat he rightfully won.

The following is clipped from the News and Observer of November 19th. Both roads are having a hot race to reach the timber section in Harnett.

There is a hot fight on between the Raleigh and Cape Fear Railroad and the Cape Fear and Northern Railroad. The first named road is being built from this city toward the Cape Fear river in Cumberland county, about twenty miles of it having been completed.

As the two roads run to practically the same point, traverse almost the same territory and were designed for primarily the same purpose—development of the lumber interests between here and the Cape Fear river, there is naturally pretty sharp rivalry between them.
